

#### **School Attendance Matters**

Missing school occasionally, happens. But as absences
add up, they start to affect your child's academics.
Missing 2 days a month will add up to 18 missed days
throughout the year. This adds up to many hours of
missed reading and math instruction, along with missed
social/emotional learning and connections with
peers. If your child is going to be absent, you need to
let the office know by 8:45am for the absence to be
excused. Call or email Terry at Humphrey 320-543-4680

even be made in the middle of the night.

After 3 unexcused absences, we are required by the county to start the process for educational neglect. At 5 unexcused absences, the county will contact you to attend a meeting and at 7 unexcused absences, they will open a case and assign an educational neglect worker. We really want to prevent this process so please reach out if there is anything the school can do to help with attendance concerns. The <a href="student handbook">student handbook</a> is also a great resource for any attendance questions.

## **Verify your Student's Information**

Each parent/legal guardian is asked to provide at least one emergency contact, other than yourself (e.g., grandparent, aunt, uncle, friend, neighbor, etc.). Emergency information may be used to contact you and/or those you designate as emergency contacts in the event of a student-related emergency if you, as parent/legal guardian, cannot be immediately reached.

To verify, update or add emergency contacts log in to your <a href="ParentVUE account">ParentVUE account</a>, click on a student, click "student information", click "edit information", edit fields and save the changes.

## **Getting Your Child with Speech and Language Needs Ready for School**

The transition from home to school can be a daunting time for any child, but for children with speech, language, and communication needs, it can be especially challenging if they have difficulties understanding verbal information, struggle to follow instructions, or find it difficult to socialize with other children. It's important that children are prepared for any changes so they can transition into school smoothly. There are several things that a parent can do to help prepare their child for this transition.

<u>Get familiar with their environment</u>. Before your child starts school, take them on a few visits to the school to see their new classroom.

<u>Build on their attention and listening skills</u>. Play simple games like 'Simon Says' and remember to always call your child's name first before giving them instructions.

<u>Help them build a friendship group</u>. There are many simple activities you could do at home that will help your child improve their social skills such as turn-taking games and board games.

<u>Talk about their feelings</u>. It is important that you discuss these feelings with your child so that they feel at ease and supported.

<u>Encourage pre-literacy skills</u>. There are fun activities you can do with your child at home that help develop phonological awareness, such as clapping out syllables in words, going on a sound hunt and singing nursery rhymes.

<u>Try to be positive and calm</u>. It's important that you remain positive and calm around your child to reduce any worries or fears they may have.

I hope these tips will help your child transition smoothly into school.
