Random Acts of Kindness



The Importance of Fine Motor Skills

As children improve their fine motor skills, they develop their independence in doing a range of tasks such as eating, writing, speaking, creating, and dressing themselves. They can access a wider source of learning activities and social experiences. Fine motor is an almost continual part of all our lives. We are continually moving, picking things up, manipulating objects, and more. The more children can develop these skills, the more they can access the world around them.

Fine motor is important for independence. Children will be able to do more for themselves and overcome the



many obstacles that come their way that involve fine motor, such as turning a door handle. When they have to rely on adults less, they will gain confidence. Having children interact with fine motor games and activities will help with improving the link between what their eyes see and what they are trying to hold and touch. Hand-eye coordination is crucial for carrying out all physical activities in life. The items to practice

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fine motor should not be digital, but rather they should be hands-on activities with solid objects.

Speech and language are powerfully linked to fine motor skills. There is a lot of research available to demonstrate the link between communication and fine motor development. Many speech and language activities are trying to develop the fine motor muscles in the face, lips, and tongue. Along with speech and language, fine motor skills affect overall brain development too. Exploring creativity with arts and crafts, drawing, playing with playdoh, constructing something, or even turning the pages of a book, help with fine motor development skills.

Children with good fine motor skills will be able to fully engage in the same activities their friends do, and on an equal footing, and this will have a positive impact on themselves and on the relationships, they have with their peers. I highly encourage students to do fine motor activities often, especially in these elementary ages, to help in their overall development and independence.

Buddies Ms. Entinger, Humphrey Elementary

The first graders in Ms. Entinger's class pair up with a fourth grader from Ms. Krueger's class for classroom buddies. Every other week we meet with our buddies to get to know one another, do art projects, read, play games,



and just spend time with students from another grade level. This helps students build more connections within the school.

The first time we met they created people and drew pictures that represent them and the things they enjoy. The second time we met we created a tree painting using tape and watercolor paints to celebrate the holidays.



The students enjoy this time and always look forward to the activities with their buddies.


