

Rayne Durant, Hamden Hall Class of 2023, is currently making waves as a freshman starting for the UMass Lowell women's basketball team. I had the privilege of interviewing both Rayne and her high school coach, Brian Johnson, head coach at Hamden Hall, to gain insights into Rayne's journey from NEPSAC to her current collegiate success.

Coach Johnson spoke highly of Rayne's exceptional skills and impact on the court. He noted, "Rayne had instincts that you can't teach on both sides of the ball. Her shot blocking ability and nose for the ball and over all intimidation defensively made Rayne different. That's why I called her "Big Rayne". Coach Johnson recalled standout moments from Rayne's high school career, including a memorable game against Dalton when Rayne went toe to toe with Mary Ashley Stevenson currently at Purdue, and of course the NEPSAC championship game, where Rayne's stellar performance earned her the MVP title for the game in addition to already claiming the NEPSAC Class C Player of the Year.

Johnson also emphasized Rayne's significant presence within the team and her contributions to the team culture. According to Coach Johnson, Rayne's work ethic and dedication to improving her game were key factors in her success. He highlighted the importance of conditioning, footwork, and expanding her skill set to prepare Rayne for the collegiate level.

As Rayne set off to join the River Hawks, Coach Johnson's advice to her was to "just work hard, be a good teammate, and a good listener." He also emphasized the importance of loving the game and maintaining a positive attitude, which he says he recognized in Rayne early in her career.

Rayne attributes her success to hard work and preparation. She highlighted the importance of putting in extra effort in shooting practice,

improving ball handling skills, and mastering rebounding techniques.

She expressed immense gratitude for her experience at Hamden Hall, "Hamden Hall allowed me to have a great coaching experience that gave me a lot of one-on-one training to be able to prepare for the collegiate level. It also allowed me to have a balance between academics and athletics. Which I think gave me a head start on being able to have time management."

Rayne's advice to current NEPSAC student-athletes is "always to have an open mind and be able to take in information. You have to be coachable and always willing to learn on and off the court. The more you take in the good information the better outcome you will have."

Team culture has always been a significant aspect of Rayne's experience, and that has not changed at UMass Lowell. She credits her current coaches for fostering a supportive environment where players feel valued and connected beyond basketball. She chose UMass Lowell because "it felt like a home away from home."
