

Learning Objectives:

1. Differentiate between the signs, symptoms, and clinical presentations of Exertional Heat Stroke (EHS) and Exertional Sickling associated with Sickle Cell Trait (SCT).
2. Demonstrate proper assessment techniques for an athlete experiencing exertional collapse, including vital signs, mental status evaluation, rectal thermometry and situational context.
3. Perform evidence-based emergency interventions, including on-site rapid cooling for EHS and oxygen administration for exertional sickling.
4. Apply current best-practice guidelines and position statement recommendations from organizations such as the NATA and ACSM to exertional collapse scenarios.
5. Develop a coordinated response plan that integrates athletic trainers, EMS, and other stakeholders to effectively manage exertional emergencies during practices and competitions.

3. Identify signs and symptoms of upper and lower extremity fractures and dislocations in the athletic setting.
4. Practice the correct application of vacuum splints and moldable devices to stabilize fractures and dislocations efficiently and safely.
5. Build muscle memory through hands-on simulation to improve speed, accuracy, and confidence in managing low-frequency, high-stakes emergency scenarios.



Bryant has been building companies and movements at the intersection of sports, technology, learning, and media for more than 25 years. As a seasoned executive, investor, filmmaker, and serial entrepreneur, he is currently working on his tenth startup company. Bryant's successes have been built on the lessons learned from a lifetime of competition, commitment, and conscience at places like West Point, Trinity, Harvard, the National Hockey League, and the frenetic startup world. Bryant created and co-produced the critically acclaimed and award-winning film "Willie" ([trailer](#)) that debuted on ESPN in 2019, and was runner-up for Best Film at the Hot Docs Film Festival. "Willie" was also featured on the American Film Showcase in partnership with the US State Department and Government Affairs Canada and has been shown worldwide across 45 countries to date, and has been translated into over 20 languages. "Willie" can currently be found on NBC's Peacock in the US and CBC's GEM in Canada. Bryant also recently produced "Beyond Their Years" ([trailer](#)) which won the Audience Award at the 2024 Essence Film Festival.

Prior to launching his entrepreneurial career, Bryant was the VP of Business Development for the National Hockey League. Bryant's entrepreneurial drive and team-building acumen has resulted in the creation, growth and profitable sale of companies such as myteam.com (sold to The Active Network), Vision Sports and Entertainment Partners (Sold to the Active Network), Sports Technologies Inc. (sold to Sports Illustrated/Time Warner) and Football Scouts Inc.(sold to ESPN).

Bryant has served on the boards of directors for the New York City Track and Field Armory and the New York Road Runners Club, the largest running club in the world, and the organizer of the New York City Marathon. Currently, he serves on the board of The USA Hockey Foundation. He also serves as a Trustee at his alma mater, The Williston Northampton School, and in alumni advisor capacities at his other alma maters, Trinity College in Hartford, CT and The John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. In his spare time, Bryant is a youth hockey administrator, an avid yoga practitioner and runner who has started and completed 26 marathons.

GEVVIE STONE


The Winsor School '03



Gevvie Stone learned to row as a sophomore at the Winsor School under the coaching of her mother, Lisa Stone. Since her novice years, she raced for Princeton, winning an NCAA Championship, and then for the USA on two U23 teams and seven senior teams. This includes three Olympic Games: 7th in London and silver in Rio in the women's single then 5th in Tokyo in the women's double.

Gevvie's rowing career was balanced with pre-medical studies in college, medical school at Tufts University, and emergency medicine residency at the Beth Israel Deaconess Hospital (across the street from Winsor!). She retired from rowing after the Tokyo Games, and after residency, she completed a sports medicine fellowship at the University of Utah.

She is now an attending physician at Cambridge Health Alliance, practicing in Emergency and Sports Medicine. She remains involved with rowing as a member of the local Cambridge Boat Club and on the US Rowing High Performance Committee and Athlete Council. She is also a team doctor for local high schools and USA Biathlon.



Distinguished Service Award

JOHN GARDNER

Avon Old Farms School

John T. Gardner joined Avon Old Farms in 1975 and quickly became one of the most successful and influential prep school hockey coaches in American history. Over his remarkable career spanning nearly five decades, Coach Gardner amassed 867 wins—more than any other coach in New England prep school hockey history. His teams captured a record nine New England Championships and thirteen Founders League titles, all while competing against the nation’s toughest opponents.

Coach Gardner’s legacy extends far beyond wins and titles. He has mentored over 30 NHL draft picks and hundreds of Division I players, including Stanley Cup champion graduates Brian Leetch '86, Jonathan Quick '05, and Nick Bonino '07. His exceptional coaching has earned

him national recognition, including the Gold Key Award from the Connecticut Sportswriters' Alliance and the John Mariucci Award from the American Hockey Coaches Association—its highest honor for a secondary school coach.

A leader in every sense, Gardner also served as associate head of school, director of athletics, varsity football and baseball coach, and beloved teacher. His philosophy—Coaching is teaching in the purest sense—has shaped generations of Avonians, emphasizing integrity, perseverance, and character.

John Gardner’s enduring impact is measured not only by championships, but by the countless young men whose lives he transformed on and off the ice.

ALAN MCCOY


Pingree School

During his tenure at Pingree Alan nearly tripled the size of Pingree's athletics program, both by fielding more teams and increasing the variety of sports offered. Alan's leadership also reached beyond Pingree as one of the founders of the Girls Eastern Independent League and its subsequent merger with the EIL boys league. Along with fellow ADs, he helped the EIL expand from a league of six schools to its current robust twelve-school membership. He served terms as both EIL president and NEPSAC District 3 president. He served regularly on NEPSAC tournament committees and, with others, promoted the expansion of NEPSAC tournament structure to include opportunities for schools of all sizes. He presented at NEPSAC workshops and was a champion of encouraging our membership to pursue professional development and certification through the National Interscholastic Athletics Administrators Association. The support of and collaboration with his colleagues in NEPSAC was a highlight of his tenure as Pingree's A.D.

In addition to his career as Director of Athletics, Alan also coached many Pingree teams, including garnering multiple EIL championships in girls basketball, girls soccer and boys lacrosse. Alan achieved the 300 win milestone in lacrosse, coaching seven high school All-Americans and four college All-Americans. Alan was twice named US Lacrosse Eastern New England Coach of the Year and once US Lacrosse Eastern New England Man of the Year. He also has a decades-long connection to the Rosebud Indian reservation and helped launch their tribal club lacrosse program.

Above all, Alan believes in the powerful positive developmental impact that athletics can have on young people. He made sure there were opportunities for student athletes to participate at all levels of ability and always strived to create balance between competition and the simple enjoyment of playing.



HOW NEPSAC BEGAN



December 7, 1941, was a quiet Sunday. For New England independent schools the date fell in that relaxed time between athletic seasons with only examinations and Christmas holidays in the offing. The dramatic and shocking report of the bombing of Pearl Harbor, as carried on the radio, shattered the mood of the day and the season so drastically that it would be years before a comparable atmosphere would be recaptured. The news fell with special poignancy upon boys' schools. As faculty met their students for dinner that night or in their classes the next morning, they were profoundly aware that the news they had so recently heard had altered irrevocably the lives and futures of their students and of their younger colleagues.

School administrations turned at once to the great question as to how they best could prepare their students for the ordeals which these young men were likely to face and at the same time provide the conventional education which would permit them to take their place in society after the war. Confidence in the principles of a liberal education held. Except for a general policy of speeding up the educational process, few radical changes were made. However, since training programs in the armed services put great emphasis on physical fitness, directors of athletics and coaches had special responsibilities. They too, felt that team competition provided the best incentive to physical fitness; hence interscholastic competition should continue and indeed, be augmented if possible.

The dream of business as usual did not last long. In early April of 1942 Herbert G. Stokinger, Director of Athletics at Milton Academy, saw in a Boston newspaper a summary of governmental regulations applying to bus companies. To his consternation he learned that transportation companies could no longer charter buses for athletic trips without surrendering any right to replacement tires for buses so chartered. Since this regulation was a direct and obvious threat to all interscholastic athletic competition, Stoky acted promptly. He telephoned his opposite numbers, Martin W. Souders of Exeter, Eliot T. Putnam of Noble and Greenough, and J. Leo Foley of Roxbury Latin; they all agreed to meet at Stoky's house for a consultation. The four men at that meeting were of one mind: there was an urgent need for an immediate gathering of representatives of as many schools as possible to determine whether interscholastic athletics could indeed continue, how athletic programs could be modified under the circumstances, and how best to meet the inevitable shortages of equipment which loomed in the future. At the urging of this *ad hoc* committee, Stoky consulted the invaluable *Porter*

Sargent handbook and sent out an invitation to all schools within a reasonable distance of Boston to attend a meeting at the Harvard Club on Saturday, April 11, 1942.

Twenty-three schools sent representatives to the meeting, and five other schools expressed their interest by submitting written reports on how they proposed to adapt their programs to the stringent governmental regulations necessitated by the war effort. As the moving spirit behind the gathering, Herbert Stokinger presided with Eliot Putnam acting as secretary for the meeting. After a brief statement from a representative of each school present as to how it proposed to deal with interscholastic competition, Eliot Putnam reported these general conclusions:

- A. In any change of policy, first consideration should obviously be given to the *spirit* in which restrictions have been imposed.
- B. Attempt to go ahead with regular schedules, canceling such long trips as demand too great an expense (train, taxis, etc.) or which seem to call on an inadvisable and unwarranted demand on private cars.
- C. Bear in mind at all times the great value of interscholastic games, both from the competitive point of view, and as a pacesetter for school morale.
- D. Proceed cautiously as regards transportation by private cars, if not covered by proper insurance.
- E. Make every effort to strengthen the intramural program in the lower classes, canceling all interscholastic competition when there is any doubt as to its advisability.

Martin Souders then remarked on what he considered to be a long-felt need for a permanent organization among the independent schools, an organization which would meet periodically for discussion, legislation, and friendly interchange of ideas. He cited the advantages enjoyed by existing college and public school organizations. His suggestion was unanimously approved, and the following officers were elected:
