As the District Deputy reports come in, I am amazed at all the good works our courts are doing and it makes me proud to be a Catholic Daughter!



Quality of Life 2023

If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth. -1 John 3:17

One of the many spokes in CDA's Circle of Love is titled Quality of Life. When I first heard this many years ago, I always thought of the old medical phrase – "let's focus on quality over quantity" when someone was nearing the end of their life. But, as I got to know and understand CDA's mission a bit more, I came to realize that it isn't just the sick and dying that deserve to talk about having a good quality of life. There are countless people in our parishes and communities that can benefit from the love and service we can provide as Catholic Daughters.

As a court, I challenge you this year to spend at least one event, meeting, or prayer focusing on compassion, and acting on that compassion. Compassionate action can take three forms: charity, service, and justice.

As you could probably recite, charity usually involves gifts of money, clothing, food, or other material goods, but does not necessarily involve an investment of our time and talents. Charity is important, but writing a check does not really change us in a fundamental way and we often remain distant from those we seek to help.

Service involves getting members face-to-face with those in need. It can be a transformative experience that can help to make us more selfless. Although generosity sometimes leads to self-satisfaction, service often becomes a very humbling experience. Charity and service are both personal forms of compassionate action. Their objective is to alleviate the effects of suffering in the world. Justice, on the other hand, seeks to eliminate the root causes of suffering.

The bible shows us that justice is synonymous with economic sharing. To follow Jesus and God leads us to a stance of looking out for the welfare of the poor and disadvantaged. Loving one's neighbor calls us to much more than charity and service; it means working for a just and equitable society. Justice is ultimately the most important factor in loving our neighbors. Philosopher and activist Cornell West once said, "Justice is what love looks like in public. You can't talk about loving folk and not fighting for justice".

So, where can you start??? The national CDA website has some great ideas – I encourage you to go there, but also, brainstorm with your courts. Some of your members may have causes that are near and dear to their hearts - When people are personally affected by something like an injustice, they are more apt to put some real work into making the world a better place. Here are some general topic ideas from the site: Family life, health, community, worldwide, protection of the environment, health and wellness, identity theft, and family values.

My call to action is simply this: Go out and do good!!! (And then report it to us next Spring ©)



CIRCLE OF LOVE REPORTING INSPIRES OTHERS TO ACTION

The seven spokes of the CDA Circle of Love - Education, Family, Leadership, Legislation,

Quality of Life, Spiritual Enhancement, and Youth/JCDA - are identified as important needs of the Church and community best served by the Catholic Daughters. To effectively respond to these needs, we must reach out and make a difference in the lives of others. When our courts plan, sponsor and conduct projects and activities serving these needs, we become the "hands and feet of Jesus" in our communities and the world. We must use the talents God gave us, pray, educate ourselves, volunteer our services and financial assistance where needed. And we know that your members and courts are doing this is in many different ways.



As local courts, you are encouraged and asked to select those portions of the Circle of Love program that your members feel comfortable working on. If you have many members, you

may decide to participate in all spokes of the Circle of Love; if your court is smaller, you may choose just a few of these areas to support each year. Either way, what you do does make a difference in your own court and in your community. Won't you share information on your most effective and rewarding projects by completing a Circle of Love Report on them?

Reporting on your Circle of Love projects is easy!

- · Local Court identifies a Circle of Love Chair for each spoke supported by the court this year
- Court identifies which project/activity on which to report for each spoke of the Circle of Love in which they participated
- Local Circle of Love Chair obtains the Circle of Love Reporting Form from the Court Regent and completes and sends the report to the State Chair for that spoke by the deadline of March 1, 2024. (Note: Individuals participating in the THEMED Education Contest must submit their entries to your local Education Chair by February 1 so the chair has time to determine entries that will be sent on to the State Chair by the March 1 deadline.)

NOTE: Local Circle of Love Chairs are asked to share their contact information (name, email, address, phone) with the State Circle of Love Chair who is guiding the spoke they will report on (State Chair's contact information is on the Circle of Love Reporting Form) By doing this, you can communicate easily and directly with the State Chair if you have any questions and when you submit your local report, and the State Chair can more easily keep you up to date with deadline reminders and tips for completing your report.



QUALITY OF LIFE: Wow! What a beautiful outpouring of love and generosity were brought forth at our summer workshops! We asked for donations of school supplies and healthy snacks for the St. Mary's Mission School in Red Lake, and you filled their shelves to the fullest.
