

CPS Class Scheduled for March 2016

We have a CPS class scheduled for March 15th & 16th, 2016 in Brainerd MN . The CPS certification is part of the requirements for the MASMS Certification Program. We have 15 openings available for this class.

The AFE fee for this training and examination is \$500. MASMS covers the cost of hotel (if you are more than 1.5 hour drive away), breakfast and lunch both days!

Study materials will be sent at least 6 weeks prior to the class. The first day of the class, and the morning of the 2^{nd} day is a review of those materials. The afternoon of the 2^{nd} day is the exam.

This class is a review of the study materials, and is not meant to be complete instruction. You must spend the necessary time studying the materials prior to the class.

The number of scholarships awarded will be based on available funds. Awards will range from \$250 to \$2000 per person. Last year MASMS awarded \$15,000 to twenty applicants. We expect to be able to award the same amount this year!



WHAT'S YOUR NEW YEAR'S SAFETY RESOLUTION PLAN?

It's that time of year again. How are you going to resolve to make the workplace safer, and what will you do to ensure your resolution sticks? The vast majority of Americans fail to achieve their resolutions, according to various studies, and many of them fail before the end of January. The reasons vary, but often it comes down to unrealistic goalsetting or trying to do too much.

"Setting small, attainable goals throughout the year, instead of a singular, overwhelming goal on Jan."

1, can help you reach whatever it is you strive for," Lynn Bufka, an associate executive director for the American Psychological Association (APA), said in an APA resolution guide.



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With that in mind, here are some tips from APA on setting New Year's resolutions, and my thoughts on how to apply them to workplace safety:

Start small. Rather than simply trying to make the entire worksite safer, focus on one particular hazard of concern.

Change one behavior at a time. Similar to the previous tip, you can't change behavior or safety culture overnight. Instead, focus on the actions that most likely contribute to the hazard

Talk about it. A goal set in a vacuum won't be achieved. Effectively communicate both the goal and the plan to achieve it. Don't forget to include input from employees as much as possible throughout the development of this process.

Don't beat yourself up. Mistakes may happen, but that doesn't mean the resolution is blown.

Figure out why an incident occurred, and take the appropriate steps to correct it.

Ask for support. Safety can't improve without support from management. Sell safety to employers to get support for your resolution.

Some thoughts for the New Year! 10 Don'ts of Positive People

Keep in mind that people who have positive attitudes most of the time are mentally strong. Here is a list of the 10 Don'ts of positive people.

Positive people:

- 1. **Don't Feel Sorry for Themselves** positive people don't sit around feeling sorry about their circumstances. Instead, they take responsibility for their role in life and get up off their butt and do something.
- 2. **Don't Give Away Their Power** positive people understand that they are in control of their life and have a choice on what they do and how they respond to situations and people.
- 3. **Don't Shy Away from Change** positive people don't avoid change. Instead, they welcome it. They understand that change is inevitable and believe in their ability to adapt.
- 4. **Don't Worry About Things They Can't Control** positive people focus on what they can control in their lives and recognize that sometimes, the only thing they can control is their attitude.



- 5. **Don't Worry About Pleasing Everyone** positive people realize that they don't need to please everyone all the time. They're not afraid to say no or speak up when necessary. They strive to be kind and fair, but can handle other people being upset if they didn't make them happy.
- 6. **Don't Dwell on the Past** positive people don't waste time dwelling on the past and wishing things could be different. They acknowledge their past and can say what they've learned from it. However, they don't constantly relive bad experiences or fantasize about the glory days.
- 7. **Don't Make the Same Mistakes Over and Over** positive people accept responsibility for their behavior and mistakes. As a result, they don't keep repeating those mistakes over and over. Instead, they move on and make better decisions in the future.
- 8. **Don't Resent Other People's Success** positive people appreciate and celebrate other people's success in life. They don't grow jealous or feel cheated when others surpass them. Instead, they recognize that success comes with hard work, and they are willing to work hard for their own chance at success.
- 9. **Don't Give Up** positive people don't view failure as a reason to give up. Instead, they use failure as an opportunity to grow and improve. They are willing to keep trying until they get it right.
- 10. **Don't Feel Entitled** positive people don't feel like the world owes them something. They understand that life isn't always easy or fair and look for opportunities based on their own merits.





PaintCare Inc. is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization established to help people recycle paint.

They help paint manufacturers plan and operate paint stewardship programs in the United States in those states that pass paint stewardship laws. PaintCare was created by the American Coatings Association, a membership-based trade association of the paint manufacturing industry.

It is more convenient than ever to recycle paint in Minnesota. Since the start of the Minnesota paint stewardship program on November 1, 2014, PaintCare has set up 228 drop-off sites where the public can take unwanted, leftover paint for recycling. These sites are at paint retailers (paint and hardware stores) and county household hazardous waste facilities that have volunteered to take back paint, and they are available to any household and most businesses in Minnesota. These locations accept paint whenever they are open for business


