

ASSET #13: Neighborhood Boundaries

Reclaiming the Neighborhood

66 D anana Kelly," which refers to the banana-curved Kelly Street in the South Bronx of New York, was probably one of the last neighborhoods anyone wanted to live in. Vacant buildings lined the rubblestrewn streets. The city considered it a hopeless neighborhood and the private sector refused to invest in it. At times people in the neighborhood would have to fill buckets from the fire hydrant because their water lines would get cut off.

Yet Harold DeRienzo had hope for the neighborhood. In fact, as everyone else was moving out, he moved in.

Harold began organizing the neighbors who were left. They learned each other's names and started doing things together. They held street cleanups and block parties, and started planting flowers. Slowly, the neighborhood began to change for the better. 'Banana Kelly needs to be viewed as a vehicle for local empowerment," Harold says. "To retain a sense of community, people have to have a sense that they're affecting their own lives."

Helpful Hints

Four steps that make neighborhood boundaries easier:

- 1. Get together with other parents on your block. Discuss neighborhood boundaries.
- 2. Find three neighborhood boundaries that everyone agrees on.
- 3. Hold a neighborhood party to report your findings. Get other's reactions.
- 4. Publish the boundaries in a one-page newsletter for everyone in the neighborhood.



What does this have to do with neighborhood boundaries? Everything, When you ask people why they don't take responsibility for monitoring young people's behavior in the neighborhood, they point to fear. They're afraid of the kids. They're afraid of the kids' parents. In essence, they're afraid of their neighbors.

It's easier to have neighborhood boundaries when people perceive their neighborhoods as caring communities. You don't need to be a community organizer to help create a neighborhood where neighbors monitor young people's behavior. All you need to do is to start getting to know the people who live near you. Start with the ones who seem friendly. Get to know the children. Talk with their parents about boundaries they would like for their children in the neighborhood. Then together you can start building this asset.

Ideas for Neighborhood Boundaries

What are some neighborhood boundaries that you might want to consider?

- · Respect each other's property.
- · Report any suspicious activity.
- Supervise children younger than 16.
- End parties by 11:00 p.m.
- Talk to neighbors directly about concerns.

Connect, Then Decide

Before you decide on appropriate boundaries for your neighborhood, connect with other neighbors to get to know them. Try these simple ideas:

- Hold a front-yard, neighborhood barbecue.
- Organize all the dog owners to take a walk together (with the dogs) once a week.
- Suggest a parent get-together. Ask older youth to supervise and play with the younger children.

- Contact your local police department and ask for help in having a block meeting to discuss safety.

Quick Tip: Notice daily what happens in your neighborhood.

- Which neighbors seem to notice what

Tips for Monitoring

Once neighbors agree on some common boundaries, encourage each other to:

- Point out boundaries to youth. For example, if a neighbor hears young people swearing, everyone should support the neighbor saying, "We don't use that kind of language in our neighborhood."
- Call other neighbors about concerns or questions. Distribute a neighborhood directory with names, phone numbers, and addresses of neighbors interested in participating.

City of Hill City Regular Council Meeting January 9, 2018

- 1. Call to Order/Pledge of Allegiance
 - A. Mayor Baker presided over the meeting and called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.
 - **B.** Everyone joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.
 - C. The following members were present: Mayor Larry Baker, Council members Terry Christensen, Dave Lange, Tina Haugen and Marci Holm.

2. Consent Agenda

Motion made by Haugen to approve the consent agenda as presented, second by Holm. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

3. Public Forum

A. Darrell Mishler – Hot Spot

Darrell Mishler was present and explained more about the "Hot Spot" matching grant and exactly the area that would be covered with the "Hot Spot". He needed \$800.00 for the matching funds from Hill City and the monthly ongoing cost would be \$100.00. The "Hot Spot" would run from Bear Park down Lake Ave. to Cedar Street and only cover 500 feet out. The Council said that they appreciated being included in the matching fund grant but decided that it would not benefit enough people in town to be feasible for the costs involved so did not want to go forward with this.

4. <u>Addition or Corrections to the Agenda</u> There were no additions or correction to the agenda.

5. <u>Reports</u> <u>Maintenance/Water/Sewer/Parks/Airport/Streets</u>

• Head Maintenance/Public Works, George Casper reported that the steering cylinder had been leaking on the tractor. Casper ordered the parts off from the internet at a cost of approximately \$300.00 to \$400.00 and him and Pat Jordan fixed the tractor themselves.

• Casper said that with the cold weather the city has had no water freeze-ups but there have been quite a few citizens that have had frozen water.

• The city hasn't had any sewer freeze-ups but a few citizens have had freeze-ups.

• Casper said that the new brush cutter that was purchased had a bent PTO shaft. Midwest Machinery ordered a new brush cutter for Hill City to replace the other one.

Fire Department

• Fire Chief Jeremy Nelson said that there had been zero calls last month.

• Chief Nelson said that they are close to combining the 1st Responders with the Fire Department.

• Nelson said that the Fire Dept. officers stayed the same as last year.

Police Department

• Police Chief Kimball gave the monthly activity report and said that it was a "steady" month.

• Chief Kimball said that the DVR went bad in one of the camera systems in one of the squad cars. The DVR is covered by warranty and new DVR is being sent.

• Chief Kimball said that it is budgeted to purchase a new squad car every 4 years. The next one will be in 2019. Kimball wanted permission from the Council to start looking for grants for equipping the new squad car now. The Council gave Kimball permission to do so.

Mayor

• Mayor Baker told everyone to keep up the good work.

• George Casper said that next year he would like to look into winter parking throughout the city because of snow plowing issues with vehicles parked on the streets.

<u>Clerk</u>

• Clerk McManigle said that the office had been very busy working on month end reports, quarterly reports, year end reports and getting paperwork together for the city auditor.

<u>Council</u>

• Council members Haugen and Lange will be attending the Experienced Officials conference later in January.

• Mayor Baker said to take the 1st Responders off from future agendas since they will be combing with the Fire Dept.

Committees: Personnel, Facilities/Equipment and Land Use

• George Casper said that Pat Jordan would like to be on the Land Use committee. Currently the Land Use Committee consists of George Casper, Tina Haugen and Terry Christensen. Everyone thought that Pat Jordan would be a welcome addition to the Land Use Committee.

6. Old Business

A. Special Events/Dance Permits

There was discussion on this ordinance and it was decided to come up with an application for any events that will be on city property and to require a minimum of 30 day advance notice for approval of the application. Insurance will also be required for the event with the city named as additional insured. An application will be presented at the next meeting.

7. <u>New Business</u>

A. Fire Relief Association - Raise Retirement -

B. Approve Resolution #2018-02

The Fire Relief Association would like to increase the retirement benefit from \$800.00 per year to \$900.00 per year.

Motion made by Baker to approve Resolution #2018-02 raising the retirement benefit from \$800.00 to \$900.00 per year effective in 2019, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor. **C.** Final payment to Baratto Bros. (5% Retainage) The total 5% retainage due to Baratto Bros. is \$30,142.44. There is still an issue with the tile not matching throughout the Fire Hall due to some replacement tiles that were installed. The total floor needs to be resealed and rewaxed. A quote was obtained from Dorholt Tile & Home Center in the amount of \$1,461.00 to seal and rewax the floor. The amount was deducted from the Baratto Bros. retainage.

Motion made by Holm to pay \$28,681.44 to Baratto Bros. for their final payment for the Fire Hall project, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

D. Fire Dept. Drug and Alcohol policy

The Fire Dept. developed a Drug and Alcohol policy for the Fire Dept., (this policy was based off from the Grand Rapids Fire Dept. policy), in lieu of following the Drug and Alcohol policy that was developed for the city employees.

Motion made by Baker to approve the Drug and Alcohol Policy for the Hill City Fire Dept., second by Christensen. Motion carried with Baker, Christensen and Haugen voting yes. Lange and Holm voted no. **E**. Aitkin County Sobriety Court donation of \$100.00. The Sobriety Court of Aitkin County has requested a donation of \$100.00 to help enable continued serviced to Aitkin County residences. Grand Rapids Police Dept. Investigator, Jeremy Nelson, helped explain the program to the Council and stated that this was an excellent program that has helped many people.

Motion made by Baker to donate \$100.00 to the Sobriety Court of Aitkin County, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.


