The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 2, Hill City, Minnesota, was called to order by Vice Chairman Jay Zapzalka at 7:01 p.m. on Monday, March 26, 2018.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Roll Call showed the following members present: Jay Zapzalka, Joell Miranda, Dorie Barnes, Bambi Lange, and Mark Meyer. Board Members absent: Sue Kaslow. Also present was Superintendent/Principal Pat Rendle, Assistant Principal Andy Dokken, Business Manager Ellie Hill, Building & Grounds Director Eric Hill and other staff and visitors.

1. Approved the Agenda as presented.
2. Approved the following:
 - *February 2018 bills presented for payment;
 - *Current bills through 03/12/2018;
 - *Investments and wire transfers;
 - *Reviewed the Activity Fund Statement;
 - *Reviewed Cash Receipts including donations.
3. FJJ Construction update.
4. There was no report from the School Attorney.
5. Transportation Report: Eric reported on the need for extra space to store things this summer. Approved to wave June, July and August lease with NorTran to have total control of the bus garage to use for storage.
6. Swarm Student Leadership: None.
7. Curriculum Committee: None.
8. School and Community Health Committee: Joell Miranda reported that the Health Fair was a success. Two hundred twenty-two (222) fair goers attended with twenty-two (22) exhibitors.
9. Safety/Transportation Committee: They met on March 6, 2018. They discussed the school safety/lockdown proceedings. They are reaching out to MN School Safety Center to get more ideas and resources for our school.
10. Negotiation Committee: Approved HCUE memo of understanding for the 2017-2019 Master Agreement. A copy of said 2017-2019 Memo of Understanding is attached to the Minutes and made a part thereof.
Approved the Building & Grounds Director 2017-2019 Contract. A copy of the Building & Grounds

Contract is attached to the Minutes and made a part thereof.

Approved the 2017-2019 AFSCME Contract. A copy of the AFSCME Contract is attached to the Minutes and made a part thereof.

Negotiation committee meetings were set for superintendent/principal at 6:00 p.m. and business manager at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 4, and assistant principal on Wednesday, April 11, 2018 at 6:00 p.m.

11. Community Education Report: Community Education Programmer Tami Meyer reported on current activities: open gym is done the end of April, homework help is still going on and archery's 3D tournament went well with 106 archers and approximately 300 people. The State Archery tournament was last weekend. Thor Dunham took third place for the junior high boys and is going to Nationals in May. Elementary through 6th/Middle School took 10th place. Beginning band is going well, JO volleyball practice has started, Leapin Leprechaun went very well and AARP is April 19. Upcoming activities are: spring elementary volleyball starts April 7, Baton on April 11, Firearm Safety on April 12, Girl Camp on April 28th at LLCC and summer ball starts the end of May. Due to construction, we will not be doing the Bike rodeo. We will make this an every other year event.
12. Early Childhood Report: Kathy Carroll gave a written report. Three year olds have been coming three days a week for two months now and have adjusted well. Some of the parents have decided to have their children come less than three days or just do half days. The budget review is done and discussed the many variables and how difficult doing this budget is. She discussed how many days are best for three year olds next year and what will be needed for classrooms. The budgets for next year are already being worked on. The Blandin Grant is due June 1st this year so she has started to work on that. Kindergarten Round-Up is set for April 27, 2018.
13. Building & Grounds Director Report: Building & Grounds Director Eric Hill and Aaron reported on the commons floor tile change order. Approved the change order #002 - Commons area tile for \$86,305.00 to Dorholt.

Mark Meyer was appointed as the alternate for the Core Leadership committee.

15. Superintendent/Principal's Report: No IASC update: Superintendent Rendle reported on the possibility of our business teacher being hired elsewhere. Discussed some options if this happens.
16. Approved hiring Shari Nelson as Prom Advisor for the 2017-2018 school year with a salary as per the current Master Agreement.
17. Approved hiring Chuck Holm as Assistant HCN Storm Baseball Coach for the 2017-2018 school year with a salary as per the current Master Agreement.
18. Tabled hiring a Junior High Baseball Coach for the 2017-2018 school
19. Approved hiring Frankie Dunham as Junior High Volleyball Coach for the 2018-2019 school year with a salary as per the current Master Agreement.
20. Discussion was held on our activities programs and coaching possibly cooping in boys and girls basketball. Superintendent/Principal Rendle and Assistant Principal Dokken will research this option.
21. Approved hiring Lisa Cannella as Home Bound Instructor for 5.0 hours per week plus 1 hour of prep, starting March 27, 2018 with pay as per hourly rate of pay.
22. Approved hiring Pamela Korhonen as Home Bound Instructor for 5.0 hours per week plus 1 hour of prep, starting March 27, 2018 with pay as per hourly rate of pay.
23. Accepted the letter of resignation from Chad Lathrop as of February 28, 2018.
24. Approved hiring of Brandi Caverly as long term substitute paraprofessional for the remainder of the 2017-2018 school year.
25. Adopted the Resolution to Expel Student "HC X1 - 18" for a period of Twelve Months. A copy of said Resolution to Expel Student "HC X1 - 18"

for a Period of Twelve Months is attached to the Minutes and made a part thereof.

26. Adopted the Resolution to Expel Student "HC X2 - 18" for a Period of Twelve Months. A copy of said Resolution to Expel Student "HC X2 - 18" for a Period of Twelve Months is attached to the Minutes and made a part thereof.

Assets are 40 key building blocks to help kids succeed. "High expectations" is one of six boundaries and expectations assets.

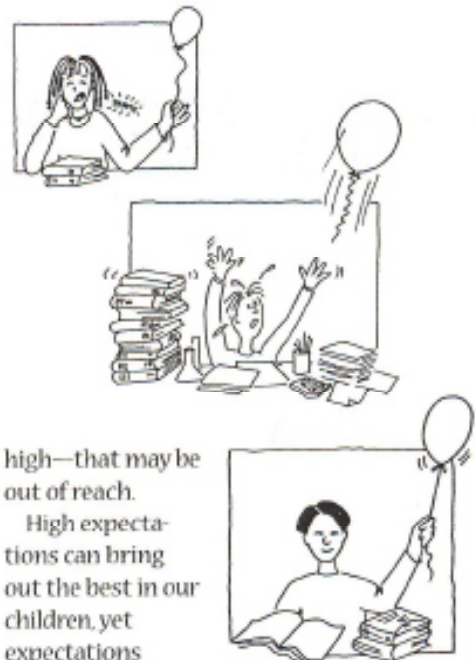

Expecting the Best

When you give a child a helium-filled balloon, it brings great joy. But if the balloon is losing air and gradually deflates, the child becomes frustrated. If the balloon is difficult to hang on to and floats away, the child cries.

A balloon is like expectations. If they're too low or too high, they're not helpful. But if the expectations are high—yet still within reach—the child holds the taut string of the balloon with an arm extended up. Expectations should make our children stretch but also still be able to see what they're stretching toward.

Expectations should differ based on each child's temperament, abilities, gifts, and talents. A natural-born athlete who is bored in physical education, goofs around most of the time, and still gets an "A," doesn't have high enough expectations set on her. The dyslexic child who struggles to keep up with the state standards of reading for his age has expectations placed upon him that are too



high—that may be out of reach.

High expectations can bring out the best in our children, yet expectations constantly need to be evaluated and revamped so that they encourage our children without discouraging them, and so that they challenge our children without frustrating them. What do you expect of your child?

Helpful Hints

Tips that make setting high expectations with your child easier:

- Educate yourself on child development so you know what's realistic.
- Continue to look for creative and new ways to stimulate your child.
- Periodically check out your expectations with your child.
- Allow your child to make mistakes and learn from them.

1. Talk about inspirational stories of people who overcame the odds or did surprising things.
 - people who overcame the odds or did surprising things.
2. Encourage your child to tackle subjects and hobbies that are difficult. Work together.
3. Model how you're currently stretching yourself.

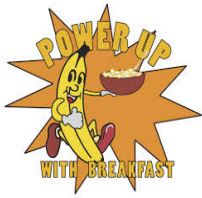
