On May 2nd, voters who live within the Independent School District 002 will decide whether we should fund a \$4 million improvement plan for the Hill City School. This is the first request from the School Board to increase local taxes for school improvements in nineteen years.

Our Needs

Last April, the School Board and administration began a series of community meetings to develop a long-term maintenance program for the Hill City School. We also conducted a study of future enrollment to determine how many students we will be serving in the future. Here is what we learned:

1. Generally, our school building is in good shape. However, after 35 years of use, the cost of deferred maintenance issues that we are facing exceeds the district's Long Term Facility Maintenance funding over the next ten years.
2. After a drop in student enrollment over the past five years, we bounced back to 280 students for 2016-17. However, the long-term trend is a gradual drop in enrollment over time, unless we can continue to attract open enrollment students early in their school lives (PreK through 2nd grade).
3. Our security system does not meet modern standards for K-12 schools.
4. Our playground and athletic facilities need repairs and improvements.

These are modest challenges for our school district. The School Board determined that it would be more economical to address these problems now, rather than delay and risk higher costs in the future.

Our Plan

After evaluating nearly \$8 million in possible projects, the School Board selected the following as the highest priority items:

- Convert the main doors to a secure entry, with an automatic lockdown system during emergencies.
- Improve our early childhood and K-2 space by remodeling classrooms and open space, as well as improving our playground.
- Replace or repair older sections of the roof, the aging skylight system, damaged bricks and caulking.
- Repair and update the gymnasium floor, locker rooms and scoreboard.
- Change the playground surface to meet federal laws for students with disabilities.
- Add irrigation to the football fields and limestone to the ball fields, along with two batting cages.
- Create a new Wellness Center and Community Education area by remodeling and expanding the current Health Room area. While also providing a separate entrance for residents to use.
- Opportunity to better meet the needs of 21st Century Education by upgrading technical education spaces, repurposing unused spaces into collaborative and special education spaces. Converting under-utilized spaces like the commons area into a dual purpose commons area/student collaborative area that is inviting with school and student pride.
- Answering Your Questions

What is the cost of this plan?

The cost will not exceed \$4 million. The district would issue 20-year bonds, funded by local property taxes, to pay for the plan. This is similar to a 20-year mortgage to update your house.

What is the tax impact?

The estimated tax impact on a \$100,000 residential homestead property will be around \$5.26 per month in additional property taxes, or 17 cents a day. You can learn about your tax impact by going to isd002.org and clicking on the tax calculator.

Will this plan help increase our enrollment?

We believe that improvements to our early childhood and K-2 spaces will attract young families to send their students here. And once a student starts with the Hill City School, we believe they will stay for good!

Is open enrollment a benefit for our school district?

Yes - every student who comes to our school from another district, or returns after trying a different school, brings their state education aid dollars with them. Those funds are used to help all Hill City students receive a better education.

Remember – This is your choice! ISD 002 will only move forward if voters approve the plan on May 2nd. Get informed and make a choice!

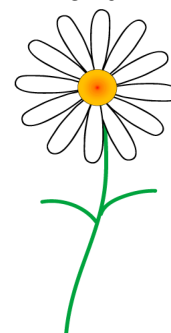

What a Difference a Hero Makes

As a single parent, Eileen felt strongly that her 10-year-old son, John, needed a male role model in his life. Her father and two brothers enjoyed being with her son, but all three lived out of state.

One day, Carlos, a neighbor, mentioned how much he and his wife missed being around children. Their two children had recently left for college, and Carlos was wishing he could find another child to spend some time with.

That was the beginning of an important relationship that developed between Carlos and John. The two would attend special events together or just hang out to talk. For one of John's birthdays, Carlos wrote and taped a story called 'John's Fictitious Adventure.'

'The more time they spent together, the more John's self-esteem grew,' Eileen says. 'Grandparents, uncles, aunts, and cousins are important, but an adult who singles out a child and chooses to spend time with that child makes a unique difference.'

Three ways to be an adult role model for your child:

- 1.** *Treat your child with love and respect.*
- 2.** *Model appropriate behavior during difficult times. When you make mistakes, admit them.*
- 3.** *Spend time together. Often. Be involved in your child's life on a daily basis.*

Kids' #1 NEED

What 10- to 15-year-olds need most is positive social interaction with adults, says Dr. Peter C. Scales, a Search Institute author and researcher. These interactions expose young people to real-life heroes.

Think back to your childhood. Who were your role models when you were a child? A teenager? A young adult? How about now?

What Teens Want to Know from Adults

Sometimes adults can feel awkward around children and teenagers and not know what to talk about. They usually don't see themselves as 'heroes' or even 'role models.' Yet when adults take time to be themselves with young people, children and youth learn a lot. Psychologist Tore Hayden asked several hundred young people what they would like to talk about with adults:

1. Family matters and decisions
2. Controversial issues
3. Emotional issues
4. Big questions and the "whys" of the world
5. The future
6. Current affairs
7. Personal interests
8. What their parents were like at their age

Questions to discuss with your child:

- Which famous people do you admire most? Why?
- Which adults (whom you know) do you look up to? Why?
- What have you learned from adults that has helped or inspired you?

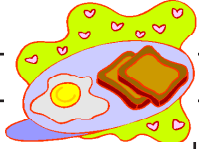

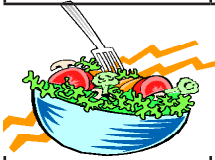
