Also present was Superintendent/Principal Pat Rendle, Assistant Principal Andy Dokken, Business Manager Ellie Hill, Building & Grounds Director Eric Hill, Jeff from FJJ, and other staff and visitor.

1. Approved the Agenda with additions.
2. Approved the following:
 - *Minutes of the Regular Meeting of September 26, 2016;
 - *September 2016 bills presented for payment;
 - *Current bills through 10/11/16;
 - *Investments and wire transfers;
 - *Reviewed the Activity Fund Statement;
 - *Reviewed Cash Receipts including donations.
3. Jeff from FJJ gave an update on the Hill City School's Long Range Facility Plan.
4. Motion to set a Board Workshop for November 9, 2016 at 7:00 p.m. to discuss the plan.
5. No report from the School Attorney.
6. Transportation Report: No report.
7. Swarm Student Leadership: Laurie Holm reported that the Swarm is very active this year. They are now planning the Veteran's Day Program for November 11th at 10:00 a.m.
8. Curriculum Committee: None to report.
9. School and Community Health Committee: Joell Miranda reported that a meeting was held on October 19, 2016 at which time the new school nurse, Carol Wuollet, was updated on what our committee does/has done. The next meeting is scheduled for November 15, 2016 at 8:00 a.m.
10. Safety/Transportation Committee: MN School Safety Center will be at our school on November 21, 2016 for a review of the school and to answer any questions we have.
11. Negotiation Committee: None to report.
12. Community Education Report: Open gym and homework help are going on now. AARP class will be on November 10th. The last elementary volleyball game will be this Thursday at 5:30, PTO and Community Ed will take over Holiday Make and Take on December 6, 2016 at 3:30.

They are working with all of the schools to come up with a plan. Bambi Lange is the IASC Treasurer. PLC's have changed this year under the direction of Superintendent/Principal Rendle and Assistant Principal Dokken. They are now in the morning and are divided into smaller groups where each groups decides what they will focus on. This seems to be working out better for the teachers. Using peer leadership again for the PLC time which includes grades 7 through 12.

After discussion on this it was determined that William Norenberg had given us the wrong Parcel ID number that he was going to be building on and that he did not need a variance as he owned the adjoining parcel that he was building next to.

Motion made by Baratto to adjourn the meeting at 6:04 p.m., second by Haugen.

Regular Council Meeting
November 9, 2016

1. Call to Order/Pledge of Allegiance/
Roll Call
 - A. Mayor Baker presided over the meeting and called the meeting to order at 6:05 p.m.
 - B. Everyone joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.
 - C. The following members were present: Mayor Larry Baker, Council members Audrey Baratto, Dave Lange and Tina Haugen. Nate Rollins was absent.
2. Consent Agenda

Motion made by Haugen to approve the consent agenda as presented, second by Lange. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

3. Public Forum
 - A. Enbridge Representatives
Representatives from Enbridge were present and gave a slide presentation of Enbridge, their existing pipelines and plans for future pipelines and replacement pipelines. They also answered questions that were asked.
 - B. Tom Fasteland
Tom Fasteland was present as a member of the Tree Board and asked the Council to approve Tree Ordinance #134 which was rewritten by Clerk McManigle with the help of Troy Holcomb from Aitkin DNR.

Motion made by Baker to approve Tree Ordinance #134 as presented, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.
Tom Fasteland also told the Council that the Lions Club had voted to give \$800.00 towards the Aquatic Invasive Species grant. This grant will pay for inspectors/educators throughout the summer of 2017. The grant amount will be a total of \$8,000.00 (\$7,200.00 grant funds & \$800.00 from the Lions Club).

Motion made by Haugen to approve applying for the 2017 grant for Aquatic Invasive Species activities, second by Lange. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.
Tom Fasteland also spoke of a Blandin Grant through the Grand Rapids Area Foundation to help build up community funds. This grant will match up to \$200,000.00 over a three-year period. The Lions Club will be having meetings on this.

4. Addition or Corrections to the Agenda
There were no additions or corrections to the agenda.

5. Reports

Maintenance/Water/Sewer/Parks/Airport/ Streets

- Head Maintenance/Public Works, George Casper, reported that they needed to buy a battery for the backhoe and a battery for the grader.
 - Casper said that a representative had come out from Case to look at the problem with the backhoe.
 - 2 weeks ago there was a problem with the Hill City Apartments and another resident reporting no water. The water tower was empty but the gauges at the pump house looked fine. Apparently the pump house and water tower lost communications. Everything is fine now.
 - The high service pump is back from being rebuilt. There is a seal that is leaking so it will probably need to go back for repairs.
 - Ritter and Ritter has started 4,000 feet of sewer line cleaning. There was a problem at Quadna because of trees on the lodge and they could not get to the lift station. Need to check to see if there is an easement for that line.
 - Casper said that there is a well from the old homestead at the sewer pond that needs to be capped. Casper had got one quote for around \$1,200.00 but would be getting more quotes.
- Motion made by Baker to preapprove up to \$1,400.00 to have the well capped, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.
- The sewer pond is being drained.
 - George reported that there was finally activity with the new RV sites. Casper had hired Mike Casper to haul fill from the stock pile from the fire hall addition after getting quotes from two other individuals. Council member Haugen questioned this as wasn't getting rid of the dirt in the bid for the Fire Hall? The answer was yes, so why are we paying to have it hauled? Ron Saxton from the Fire Dept. will check into this with the contractor about reimbursement for the hauling.

- The bathhouse is closed for the season.
- Casper is waiting for the final report on the airport inspection.

- Casper wants to grade the street one more time before freeze-up.

Fire Department

- Ron Saxton from the Fire Dept. reported that Rick Herrick and Lee Howard had completed their 6 month probationary period and both were enrolled in Fire Fighter I and Fire Fighter II training. Also, Kayla Perkins had resigned from the department.
- An ISO update is coming at the end of the month.
- There were 2 calls last month.
- Saxton let the Council know that Jacobson had a fire truck in for repairs so the Hill City Fire Dept. may be getting called out for mutual aid.
- Nominations for the Fire Dept. officers were done.
- A committee has been formed to look into combining the Fire Dept. and the 1st Responders.
- The Fire Dept. wants to have one of the fire fighters clean the new fire hall and will be budgeting for this in the 2017 budget.

Police Department

- Ron Saxton reported that the "new" squad car is almost ready to go.

Mayor

Mayor Baker said that everything was going excellent and everyone was doing a great job.

Clerk

- Clerk Diana McManigle went over the election results and reminded the Council that the meeting to canvas the results was set for Tuesday, Nov. 15th at 3:00 p.m. at City Hall.
- Clerk McManigle also let the Council know that Council training was coming up at the beginning of 2017 for both newly elected officials and for experienced officials. McManigle will get these out to all of the Council so that this can be budgeted for.

Council

There was nothing from the Council.

Committees: Personnel, Facilities/Equipment and Land Use

- There were no committee reports from the Personnel Committee, Facilities Committee or the Land Use Committee.

6. Old Business

A. Approve Tree Ordinance #134

This was approved previously at this meeting.

B. Approve Aquatic Invasive Species grant application

This was approved previously at this meeting.

7. New Business

A. Approve Liquor Lic. Renewals

Motion made by Lange to approve all Liquor Lic. renewals as long as all of the required documents are submitted and the 1st half of the licenses are paid, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

B. Approve 2016 Water/Sewer Assessments for unpaid utilities

Motion made by Lange to approve the unpaid water/sewer utilities to be assessed against property taxes unless they are paid prior to November 28th, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

C. Canvas Election Results

The results of the election will be canvassed on Tuesday, Nov. 15th at 3:00 p.m. at City Hall.

D. McNeil Excavating bill

McNeil Excavating had submitted a bill in the amount of \$2,240.00 for equipment rental per Maintenance Dept., George Casper, for McNeil's use of a loader at the sewer pond for storm clean-up. The Council discussed this and because McNeil Excavating was not hired by the Council to help with storm clean-up, this bill would not be paid. There were numerous other volunteers during storm clean-up that were not paid also.

Motion made by Baker to not pay the McNeil Excavating bill, second by Haugen.

Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

Motion made by Lange to adjourn the meeting at 7:06 p.m., second by Baratto.

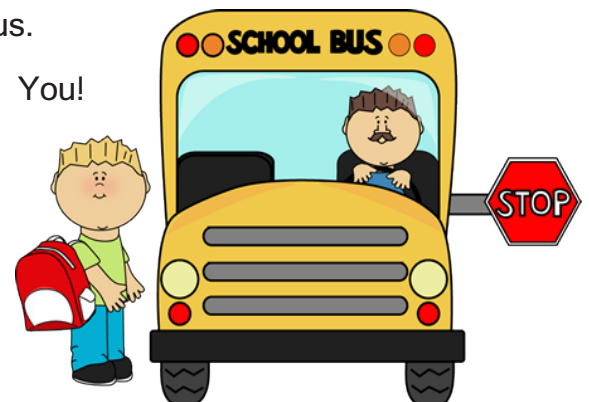

Practical Suggestions for Building Assets in Your Child

What Are Assets?

Assets are 40 key building blocks to help kids succeed. "School boundaries" is one of six boundaries and expectations assets.

* Based on Search Institute surveys of almost 100,000 6th- to 12th-grade youth throughout the United States.

Working Together to Form Boundaries

An assistant principal of a middle school in Colorado was fed up with discipline problems. So many students were behaving badly that he expelled 97 of them.

Then the assistant principal was suspended. Why?

Because while some parents and teachers supported his action, many thought the expulsions were too extreme and poorly handled. They demanded his suspension because they felt he was using unusually harsh punishment to enforce school boundaries.

All schools need boundaries. They need to set clear standards and expectations for how students should act and learn. Yet setting these standards isn't easy—and neither is enforcing them. Many schools grapple with how to discipline students in appropriate and effective ways.

As a parent you can help the process by working with your child's school. Encourage your school to create a conduct code at the beginning of the year, review the code with the students, and send a copy of it home to inform parents. Suggest that students help in



creating the code. For example, Streetwater High in National City, California, created "The Link Crew"—twelfth graders who explained the dos and don'ts of behavior to new students and talked with students with whom teachers were struggling. Grades and attendance improved, and fewer new students spent time in the principal's office.

When parents and educators work together, they can create a supportive environment for establishing and enforcing school boundaries. And the more families, schools, and communities work together to establish consistent boundaries, the better off our children will be because they will know what to expect.

Helpful Hints

Tips that make creating clear school boundaries easier:

- **Get involved in a parent-teacher policy organization.**
- **Focus on the positive and build on what's working.**
- **When conflicts occur, don't be pushy. Calmly state your concern and suggest solutions.**

Evaluate Your Child's School

Inform yourself about school boundaries by visiting your child's school and asking yourself these questions:

- Overall, how are students behaving?
- How do adults and students interact with each other?
- When conflicts occur, how are they resolved?
- How do the school boundaries you observe match the boundaries you have at home?

What's Your View?

Public Agenda interviewed more than 1,100 Americans about education reform. They found that:

- 54% say teachers are doing either a "fair" or "poor" job dealing with discipline.
- 52% say it is a serious problem that local public schools aren't teaching good work habits, such as being on time and doing homework.
- 49% say the worst-behaved students are getting most of the attention.

Do you agree with these statements when you think about the education your child is getting? Why or why not? Contact the president of your school-parent group (such as a PTA or PTO) and raise these issues. Or talk to the principal or a teacher. Discuss how parents and educators can work together and make school boundaries an issue people feel good about.

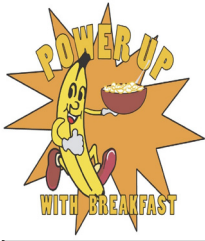
