The Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 2, Hill City, Minnesota, was called to order by Chairman Sue Kaslow at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, February 23, 2015.

Roll Call showed the following members present: Sue Kaslow, Joell Miranda, Bambi Lange, Jay Zapzalka and Mark Meyer. Board Members absent: Brent Welk. Also present was Superintendent/Principal Dean Yocum, Business Manager Ellie Hill, and Amy Wyant.

- 1. Approved the Agenda with additions.
- 2. Approved the following:
 - *Minutes of the Workshop Session of January 22, 2015;
 - *Minutes of the Regular Meeting of January 26, 2015;
 - *January 2015 bills presented for payment;
 - *Current bills through 02/09/15;
 - *Investments and wire transfers;
 - *Reviewed the Activity Fund Statement;
 - *Reviewed Cash Receipts including donations.
- 3. Amy Wyant brought a power point presentation overview of SHIP. A policy meeting is scheduled for March 13, 2015 at 8:00 a.m. They received a grant from MN DOT in the amount of \$2493.00 for the Bike Rodeo. She explained the teacher's survey, energizer workshops, and the action plan for Hill City School and Community Health Committee.
- 4. There was no report from the School Attorney.
- 5. Transportation Report: No report.
- 6. Swarm Student Leadership: No report.
- 7. System Accountability Committee: The name of this committee has changed to Curriculum Committee. The next meeting is March 5, 2015 at 3:15 p.m. in Room 206.
- School and Community Health Committee: Joell Miranda reported on the School and Community Health Committee meeting of February 13, 2015. Ann Rivas from Aitkin Co. Health & Human Services spoke about setting up training for teachers and staff to recognize mental health disorders. The program is called QPR – Questions, Persuade & Refer. Jodi from SNAP updated us on the Fruit and Vegetable Program. We all discussed different ways to get info out to parents. Some ideas were: Fun Fact Sheets, Info at Roadside, and on the new Facebook page. An information table was set up by Jodi and Amy for Parent/Teacher Conferences. Amy from SHIP reported the Jump-a-thon was a big success. We are the only school in the county that participates in this program. The school action plan has been updated. Energizer Workshop is scheduled for February 19. The Bike Rodeo Grant was received from MNDOT for \$2493.00. Ellie Hill reported about new regulations for school nutrition and what is now allowed and not allowed. The Wellness Policy Subcommittee was formed and will meet on February 27, 2015 to review the policy. The next meeting is scheduled for March 27, 2015 at 8:00 a.m.

- 9. Safety/Transportation Committee: The next meeting is set for March 11, 2015 at 3:30 p.m. in the office conference room.
- 10. Negotiation Committee: A closed board meeting for negotiation strategy will be held on March 12, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. in the office conference room.
- 11. Community Education Report: Community Education Programmer Jessica Lathrop submitted a detailed written report touching on many of the programs under the Community Education umbrella: elementary sports, adult classes, after school tutoring, AARP class, JO Volleyball, Kids Plus, Little League, and disc golf course.
- 12. Maintenance Supervisor report: Gym floor repairs on the big gym need to be done as soon as possible.
- 13. Superintendent/Principal Yocum reported that Northern Lights is part of Student Success and the current director of this program is Nick. He has asked to be a member of IASC.
- 14. Superintendent/Principal Yocum stated that the multidistrict staff development day was held on February 17, 2015.
- 15. Discussion was held on the School Calendar with starting the school year before Labor Day, discussion on PLC time for teachers next year. We won't have as many seniors so don't know if it is going to work the same.
- 16. School e-mail accounts have been set up for School Board Members and will be used from now on.
- 17. Approved the new contract for Health & Safety Services with Northeast Service Cooperative.
- 18. Approved the 2015-2016 School Calendar.
- 19. No action taken on the Resolution Proposing to Place Instructional Staff on Unrequested Leave of Absence.
- No action was taken on the Resolution Relating to the Termination and Nonrenewal of Teaching Contract for Probationary Teacher.
- 21. All the meetings attended went well and much as learned.
- 22. Set the closed negotiations strategy meeting for March 12, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. in the Office Conference Room.
- 23. Meeting adjourned at 8:03 p.m.

Photos of Friends: Snapshots of Responsibility

The best way to encourage children to choose positive, healthy relationships is to model them ourselves. Take out an old yearbook or photo album. Look at pictures of the friends you had as a teenager.

Think about the friends who acted in ways you admired. Most people can remember at least one person who always sensed when things weren't going well and called sent a note, or showed up to find out what was wrong. Often, these are the people who turned out to be lifelong friends.

How about people who weren't such true friends? Was there someone who spread rumors about you, or talked behind your back? Did you ever have a friend who tried to get you to do things you didn't want to do? The pain of these kinds of experiences often teaches young people a lot about how they want to be treated by others.

March 11, 2015

- 1. Call to Order/Pledge of Allegiance/Roll Call
- A. Mayor Baker called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.
- B. Everyone joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.
- C. The following persons were present: Mayor Larry Baker, Council Members Dave Lange, Tina Haugen and Audrey Baratto. Nate Rollins was absent.

Staff present: Diana McManigle, George Casper, Jeff Madsen and Mike Boleman.

2. Consent Agenda

Motion made by Lange to approve the Consent Agenda as presented, second by Baratto. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

- 3. Public Forum
- A. Frank Scherf, TZD Liaison for the N.E. Region of the Dept. of Public Safety was present and gave an overview of the TZD (Towards Zero Deaths) program. The TZD program is a new version of the Safe and Sober program. There are four regions within the state of Minnesota and every year each Region nominates two police departments as Outstanding Law Enforcement Agencies. This year the Hill City Police Department was awarded a new Stalker XLR LIDAR for being one of the two Outstanding Law Enforcement Agencies in the N.E. region.
- B. Neal Roettger was present with a request that the city consider having non-motorized watercraft rentals at the Hill Lake Beach. The rentals could include canoes, kayaks, paddleboats, etc. This was discussed and Council member Haugen said that she would check into this along with lifejackets.
- 4. Addition or Corrections to the Agenda There were no additions or corrections to the agenda.
- 5. Reports

Maintenance/Water/Sewer/Parks/Airport/Streets

• Head Maint./Public Works, George Casper, reported that he had gotten a quote on the cost of materials to insulate the Maintenance Shop. The total cost for materials from Latvala Lumber came to \$3,177.68. Casper stated that he and Pat Jordan (Maint. Asst.) would be doing the work of installing the insulation.

Motion made by Baratto to approve purchasing the materials to insulate the Maintenance Shop, second by Lange. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

- Casper reported everything has been fine with the water. There has been one freeze-up where the people had been gone for one week and the water froze.
- A couple of the sewer pumps have been running an extra hour a day due to the infiltration from the snow melting.
- Casper reported there is a free Playground Safety, Compliance and Maintenance Seminar in Mt. Iron on April 8, 2015 that he would like to attend. Eric Hill from ISD #2 will also be attending. Council member Haugen said that she would like to attend and also Deputy Clerk Tami Meyer would like to attend.

Due to the fact that Clerk McManigle will be on vacation on April 8th, the City Hall office will be closed that day.

• The city has received the 2015 Clarke Mosquito Control Contract. The city usually only has the Hill Lake Park sprayed once a year, but it was discussed to have it sprayed twice this year.

Motion made by Haugen to have the Hill Lake Park sprayed for mosquitos on June 1st and on July 1st this year, second by Lange. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor.

- Council member Haugen would like to see what the revenues versus the expenses are for the Hill Lake Park. Clerk McManigle will supply this to the Council and it will be discussed at the April 14, 2015 meeting.
- Casper stated that as soon as the roads dry up some more, he will be working on the potholes.

Fire Department

- Assistant Fire Chief Boleman reported that there had been one call last month. The Fire Dept. is getting the trucks ready for grass fires. Next month all of the trucks should be getting certified.
- Council member Lange stated that burning restrictions had started today and you need to get a permit if you want to burn.
- Boleman also reported that the Fire Relief's annual fish fry is April 18, 2015.

Police Department

- Police Chief Madsen reported that there is letter from Attorney Haberkorn that a Council member has received and that everything in the letter has been dealt with.
- Madsen stated that the Hill City Police Dept. needs training on the use of the new Stalker XLR LIDAR handheld unit that the department was just awarded. The training is free from the State Patrol and Madsen would like to hold a training on it in the Community Room. Madsen will also be holding a training class on car seats and a liquor servers class this year. Madsen stated that he would like to purchase a screen projector to have for these classes. The screen projector will cost between \$500.00 and \$800.00 and could come out of the Drug Fund. Council member Lange felt that since the screen projector will only be used a couple of times a year that possibly Madsen could talk to the school and partner with them. Council member Haugen suggested that Madsen check into leasing a screen projector for the times that he may need one.
- Madsen stated that the annual Chiefs Conference is in April and would like to attend. The total cost of room and registration is approximately \$670.00, which can come out of the Drug Fund.

Motion made by Haugen to allow Madsen to attend the Chiefs Conference in April, second by Lange. Motion carried with all member present voting in favor.

Mayor

• Mayor Baker stated that winter is almost over thanked everyone for all of their hard work.

Clerk

- Clerk McManigle gave a report on the credit/debit cards usage since the city begin accepting them in December, 2014. There were 8 cards used in Dec., 11 used in Jan., and 17 used in Feb. There currently are 4 recurring accounts.
- Clerk McManigle stated that Lori Jellison had contacted City Hall again about her giving the city the Kendrick property. The Council had discussion on this and told Clerk McManigle to contact Lori Jellison and tell her that the city was not interested in the property.
- Phillip Gerber, who was unable to attend the meeting this evening, had contacted Clerk McManigle in regard to finding out from the Council if the city would be willing to do a tax abatement on an addition that he hopes to add onto his existing business. He wants to put up a 30' x 80' addition to manufacture hydraulic power units. Phillip has been meeting with Ross Wagner and a couple of Commissioners from Aitkin and it sounds like Aitkin County may be willing to do a tax abatement on their share of the taxes for this addition also.

Motion made by Baker to approve a tax abatement of the city's portion of the taxes for Phillip Gerber's business, Northland Hydraulics, addition, second by Haugen. Motion carried with all members present voting in favor of.

• Clerk McManigle let everyone know about the Constitution Alive sessions that Lisa and Pat Jordan are facilitating at the Hill City School. These are free to everyone and anyone wanting to attend needs to sign up with Community Ed. at the school. Dates and times are posted in the entry way of City Hall.

George Casper had just received a phone call about another water line that was frozen. The people had just been gone overnight and this was a house that has never froze before. Casper asked the Council if the Council wanted to have the residents run their water again or just on a case by case basis. At this time the Council elected to deal with the water freeze ups on a case by case basis.

- Council member Lange reported that he had attended "Day on the Hill" at the Capitol with the Landscapers Association on Wednesday, March 4th and "Day on the Hill" Thursday, March 5th for townships, cities and schools. He said it was quite informative.
- Council member Baratto said that she was upset because a staff member from Representative Nolan was at the school last week and no citizens except Ben and Audrey Baratto were there. Council member Baratto said that in the future when "political figures" come to Hill City to meet with the citizens, that notifications need to posted so that people know about it.

Arrowhead Transit

A great thing about living in a small town or out in the country is that you can depend on your neighbors and your family to help you out.

A really tough thing about living in a small town or out in the country is that you have to depend on your neighbors and your family; and sometimes they just don't have the time or the resources.

The state of Minnesota has recognized that there are certain primary needs that everyone has. Those basic needs are: food, shelter, clothing and medical. But providing for those needs requires access to transportation.

That's where Arrowhead Transit comes in.

There is opportunity for people who live in Hill City and surrounding areas to take the Arrowhead Transit bus to Grand Rapids once every week. This bus starts picking up at 9:00 in the Hill City area and arrives in Grand Rapids by 10 am. It may used for people to go shopping, for medical appointments or whatever other else a person may choose to do in Grand Rapids. The cost is \$4.60 for the round trip.

The one contingency for this trip is that there must be a minimum of 5 people who use this bus. Throughout the Arrowhead of Minnesota, Arrowhead Transit has been providing transportation for people in rural areas to get to larger cities. For most of these scheduled bus trips, there are one, two or three people who are self appointed to call Arrowhead Transit with a list of people that will be taking this bus.

Question: Do you need to get to Grand Rapids on a semi-regular basis?

If so: Are you willing to talk to others you know who also need to get to Grand Rapids? There are several people in Hill City who have found this transportation service to Grand Rapids to be essential —and a lot of fun.

They have asked us if we could guarantee that the Arrowhead Transit bus would make the trip to Grand Rapids, at least through the month of March and at least on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month. We agreed we would do that. But our regular riders to Grand Rapids still number less than 5.

So what we need are just a few more regular riders to make this transportation service to Grand Rapids a permanent reality.

Is this a transportation service that you could find beneficial?

Then try it. You may find that this service gives you just what you need to live an independent, stress free life in beautiful Hill City, MN!

And if it works for you, tell others about it. Become the person who calls in the names of four others that will be making this trip; guaranteeing for them, and yourself, that this bus will be making the trip to Grand Rapids.




