# Parents: Do You Understand The Effects Of Hearing Loss On Your Child's Development?

#### National Awareness Month Educates Parents About Hearing Disorders Affecting School Performance

Hearing is critical to a child's speech and language development, communication, and learning, yet children with hearing problems continue to be an under-identified and underserved population.

This May, as part of Better Hearing and Speech Month, the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) is urging parents to take their child for a hearing screening if they suspect a problem.

Warning to Parents: The earlier a hearing loss occurs in a child's life, the more serious the potential effects on the child's development. However, the earlier the problem is identified and intervention begins, the less serious the ultimate impact will be.

There are four major ways in which hearing loss affects a child:

- It causes delays in the development of receptive and expressive communication skills (the child's speech and language skills develop more slowly).
- The language deficit adversely affects the child's vocabulary, sentence structure, and speaking ability, causing learning problems that result in reduced academic achievement.
- These learning and academic problems often lead to social isolation and poor self-esteem.
- The inability of the child to effectively communicate and socialize with others and the low self-esteem that often occurs frequently have a detrimental impact on the child's future vocational choices.

#### What Can Parents Do?

Research indicates that children identified with a hearing loss who begin services early may be able to develop language (spoken and/or signed) on a par with their hearing peers. If a hearing loss is detected in your child, early family-centered intervention is recommended to promote language (speech and/or signed, depending on family choices) and cognitive development. An audiologist, as part of an interdisciplinary team of professionals, will evaluate your child and suggest the most appropriate audiologic intervention program.

# Hill City Archery Team Competes at State Archery Tournament

The Hill City Archery Team brings home some medals and honors at the 2012 National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) Minnesota State Archery Tournament held in Champlin on March 31. Over 900 students competed at this year's State Tournament, breaking the attendance record of 862 archers set in 2011.

The Elementary Team placed 2nd with 2,901 points, which earned them a plaque for the team, and the Middle School Team placed 5th with 3,031 points. Both teams had qualifying National scores. The team also had 3 members from the high school division who competed as individuals.



Brittany Benson was awarded the State Girls Spirit Award, presented by Level 4 Archery Instructor from Grand Rapids, Arne Moe. Brittany was awarded a plaque and a \$100 gift card to Cabela's. She was nominated by her peers, coaches and teachers. She had the most nominations from Minnesota. The team also had four individual archers who qualified for Nationals and received individual honors.

#### ASSET #36: Peaceful Conflict Resolution

FAST FACTS

Youth are more likely to grow up healthy when they seek to resolve conflict nonviolently.

#### What Are Assets?

Assets are 40 key building blocks to help kids succeed. "Peaceful conflict resolution" is one of five social competencies assets.

7 Steps to Resolving Conflicts

hildren who learn how to think about their relationships with other people do better in life in general," says Myrna B. Shure, Ph.D., a developmental psychologist. Shure created the I Can Problem Solve (ICPS) program, which focuses on the thinking skills needed for young people to resolve conflicts peacefully.

Shure suggests before young people begin discussing a specific conflict that they find out if the time and place are good for the discussion. If so, they can begin the seven-step process. If not, they should identify a time and place that work for everyone involved. Then:

- Identify the conflict. Have each person talk about what happened. Each person's account is equally important.
- Talk about the events that led to the conflict. What happened first? Second? What escalated the conflict?
- Name how you feel. Ask others involved to identify how they feel. Encourage people to be honest about how they feel without blaming others.
- Listen carefully to each person's feelings and accounts of the conflict. Use empathy skills. Try to understand each person's point of view.
- Brainstorm solutions. Be creative. Affirm each person's ideas but keep encouraging people to think of different solutions.
- Evaluate each solution. Choose one solution that everyone agrees on.



Monitor how the solution works. If something needs to change, start again.

If children can learn to solve typical everyday problems, they are less likely to become impulsive, insensitive, withdrawn, aggressive, or antisocial,' Shure says.'In the long run it is important for children to learn how to think about the problems they encounter in their dealings with other people."

#### Helpful Hints

Tips that make peaceful conflict resolution easier:

- · Have everyone involved honestly state their needs and wants without blaming
- Have everyone listen, listen, listen, and try to understand each other.
- · Stay focused on the conflict at hand; do not bring up other conflicts.
- Emphasize creative problem solving and creating solutions not stated.
- Negotiate until a win-win result is found.

approach: CAPS, Cool off,
Agree to work it out. Point out
your view. Solve the problem.

Admit when you've responded poorly to conflict. Apologise.
 Suggest new ways to solve the conflict.

Quick Tip: Give children the power to solve their own conflicts.

- What is your initial reaction when you're in a conflict with someone? Why?
- Which conflicts in your past have had outcomes that pleased you? Why?
- What conflicts and difficulties are you currently dealing with? What steps can we take together to deal with them?

With your child, review this year and set goals for the future

It's the end of a busy school year. Your child has learned a lot. She read new books, She mastered new skills. Now is a good time to talk about the lessons she learned.

Schedule a special time to talk—go out for ice cream or share a favorite snack at home. During your talk:

 Look back. What was her favorite project this year? In what subject did she improve the most? Which book that the class read was her favorite? What goals did she accomplish?



- Look forward. What excites her about next year? Is there a subject she'd
  like to improve next year? Are there books she wants to read? Does she
  have a summer reading list?
- Focus on the positive. "You really worked hard this year. You can do challenging work when you put your mind to it!"
- Plan "thank yous." Who really helped your child succeed this year?
   A special teacher? Her softball coach? Teachers, coaches and school staff cherish notes of appreciation from students and parents.
- Make summer plans. Help her think about something she'd like to learn during the summer. Then together, make a plan to help her achieve that goal.

#### Offer alternatives to 'media time'

Some kids spend their summers staring at TV screens, computer monitors or cell phones. They miss out on time for exercise, reading and friends. As you set limits on media time, suggest alternate fun activities. Your child could:

- Get a hula hoop. Even if your child is indoors, a hula hoop is an easy way to get some exercise. Besides twirling it, your child can use it as a jump rope.
- Explore nearby playgrounds.
   There are lots of ways for kids to let off steam—and build muscles.
- Use sidewalk chalk. Play hopscotch. Trace your child's body and have him draw in his face and clothes.
- Learn to juggle. Check out a book on juggling from the library.
   This is a great way to teach fine motor skills.
- Start a book club and have weekly "book swaps" with friends.
- Go retro. Talk about your favorite childhood summer memories, and have your child reenact them!

#### Expand your child's world

Summertime is a great time to focus on geography. Get a large map of the world. Post it where your child can see it every day. Look for place names and help your child find them on the map. Try looking:

- On canned and boxed food.
- On clothing labels.
- · In letters and ads.
- · In newspaper articles.

A: Your son has had a rough year. But you can use the summer to help him catch up. Here are some steps you can take:


- Meet with your child's teacher.
   Together, come up with a summer-long learning plan. Find out where your son really needs to improve—then ask for specific activities you can do at home to build his skills. Ask about free summer learning programs.
- Set some reading goals. How
   many books will he read? Let him pick
   the books—don't worry if they aren't all "classics." Help him find books
   about his interests and hobbies.
- Build study time into his summer schedule. Set aside some time each day. Perhaps his teacher can give you work sheets or an old math book so he can practice. Check the library and office supply stores for resources.
- Do fun things together. Learning doesn't have to be drudgery! Visit
  the zoo or a museum. Look for a free concert. All these are ways to learn
  that don't cost money.




#### Are you preventing the summer slide?

#### Three keys to self-esteem

Children who feel good about themselves are more likely to be successful in school and in life. Three keys to building your child's self-esteem are:

- Acceptance. Send the message that your child is loved and accepted. Be attentive to her needs. Say you love her.
- Limits. Having boundaries will give your child a sense of security. You can adjust these as she matures and demonstrates responsibility.
- Respect. Children respect others when they are treated with respect. Use the same manners with your child as you do with your friends. Listen when your child participates in family discussions.

#### Banish summer boredom

Worried about what to do when your child says "I'm bored"? Plan ahead! Have your child help you write ideas for fun activities on slips of paper, like "bake brownies" or "play on the swings." Write a few simple chores on slips of paper, too, like "weed the flower bed." Place all of the slips of paper into a jar or bowl. When your child says he's bored, have him choose a slip of paper and do whatever it says!

#### Add fun to summer math

Ask casual questions to review your child's math skills during the summer, such as:

- How much will we pay for two ice cream cones?
- How much change will I get if I pay \$5.00 for this \$3.84 item?

#### City of Hill City Council Meeting April 10, 2012

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, the regular Council meeting was held in the Community Room. Mayor Larry Baker presided over the meeting and called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Members present: Larry Baker, Scott Martin, Audrey Baratto and Dave Lange. Ken Rollins was absent.

The Pledge of Allegiance was said.

Motion made by Martin to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of 3/14/12, second by Lange.

All members voted yes, Motion carried

Butch Doree was present and suggested to the Council that the Council put a boat "marina" at the Hill Lake Park as it could bring in some extra revenue. There is a Park "remodeling" committee established consisting of the City Engineer, Dave Lange, Ken Rollins and George Casper because of the addition of property to the park. Council member Lange asked Butch Doree if he would be willing to be added to the committee. Butch agreed he would.

Motion made by Martin to approve the Municipal Maintenance Agreement for Co. State-Aid Hwy #33 (Lake Ave.) for the amount of \$2,051.30, second by Lange.

All members voted yes, Motion carried G. Casper told the Council that the street sweeper had been

in contact in regard to sweeping the streets this year. The sweeper charges \$110.00 per hour and felt that since the streets were not swept last year that it would take approximately 12 to 14 hours to complete the sweeping.

Motion made by Lange to approve the street sweeping for up to \$1,500.00, second by Baker.

All members voted yes, Motion carried George Casper said that he would be grading the streets as soon as there some moisture to soften them up.

There has been an ongoing issue with delinquent water/sewer billings and change ownership of properties. Currently the City assesses any delinquent water/sewer billings to the taxes in the fall of each year. When a property sells with delinquent water/sewer, usually either the Realtor for the property or the closing company of the property calls for any delinquent charges on the property so that the delinquency can be taken care of at the closing of the property. There have some properties that have sold that no one has called for the delinquent amounts owing or the delinquent amounts have not been taken care at closing. When this happens the property changes ownership and the City is unable to assess the delinquent charges to the property taxes for collection due to the fact that there is a new owner of the property. According to the City Attorney, the City's only recourse is to take the previous owner to small claims court.

Motion made by Lange for the City to start taking these individuals to small claims court, second by Martin.

All members voted yes, Motion carried

Council member Lange believes that it is the Realtors responsibly to see that all delinquencies are taken care of at closing and wants this researched.

The hiring committee for the Seasonal Park Attendant had hired Theresa Washburn for the position. Theresa turned the position down as she already has a full time position. The

position was then offered to the second choice, Tammy Root, who has accepted the position.

George Casper said that he is looking at opening the Hill Lake Park for camping either the last week of April or the first week of May due to the unseasonably warm weather and the possibly of fishing opener being moved up one week earlier this year. Also, George had contacted the DNR and they are going to assist him with moving the fishing pier back into place at the Hill Lake Park this year.

City Hall had received a call in regard to if there would be any permits necessary for a temporary asphalt plant to be set up in the parking lot of the Chalet out at Quadna. The head of the Zoning Committee, Council member Baratto, had called them back for more details and was told that they had not yet received the actual bid for the Hwy 200 project they were just checking on what the permit needs may be. There are a couple of issues that need to be checked into prior to the Council approving anything an since the bid has not yet been accepted there is a little time for the Council to determine what permit(s) need be obtained.

Motion made by Martin to approve the bills as presented, second by Baratto.

All members voted yes, Motion carried Jeremy Finke (Head Maint./Public Works) had submitted his resignation on Monday, April 9, 2012 due him accepting a job elsewhere. Motion made by Martin to accept Jeremy Finke's resignation, second by Lange.

All members voted yes, Motion carried Mayor Baker said that the City wished Jeremy the best of luck with his new job.

Due to Jeremy's position being covered with the 49er's Union, his position would be offered internally first to the other employees within the City based on seniority. Clerk/Treasurer Gillson turned down the position, Deputy Clerk Meyer verbally declined the position prior to the Council meeting. The Council then asked George Casper if he would accept the position. George Casper accepted the position.

Motion made by Lange to promote George Casper to Head Maintenance/Public Works at the same rate of pay that Jeremy Finke had been receiving effective Monday, April 9, 2012, second by Martin.

All members voted yes, Motion carried There was a request from Jeremy Finke that he take his 82.48 hours of accrued PTO time, (Personal/Sick leave), time off as his 2 weeks notice. The Union Rep. for the City had stated that the City was under no obligation to pay out any of this accrued time to Jeremy since he did not provide the City with written notification of his resignation at least two weeks prior to his intended termination date at which time he would have been entitled to payout of 40% of his unused PTO time. This position will advertised in the Grand Rapids Herald Review paper twice, once in the Aitkin Independent Age and also at the Unemployment office in Grand Rapids. The pay for the position will be depend upon qualifications and comparable worth points.

The hiring committee will be George Casper, Mayor Baker, Council member Lange and a citizen from the City. There will be a posting at both the US Post Office in Hill City and at City Hall for anyone interested in being on the hiring committee to sign up or call City Hall.

George Casper stated that the mower deck for the City's small John Deere rider was getting weak and not cutting properly anymore and would like to purchase a new deck at a price of \$1,200.00. The Council told him to go ahead and purchase the new deck.

George Casper wanted to get rid of the City's old sander and if it was worth it, to put it up on auction. He said if it wasn't worth anything, he would take the motor out of it and scrape the rest of it. He did not want to make that decision on his own and suggested the Council member's Lange and Martin make the decision of which way to go. The Council agreed with Casper.




