The goal of the READ Act is to have every Minnesota child reading at or above grade level every year, beginning in kindergarten, and to support multilingual learners and students receiving special education services in achieving their individualized reading goals in order to meet grade level proficiency. 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1. Read Act Goals

District or Charter School Literacy Goals

Stewartville Public School District (0534-01)'s literacy goal(s) for the 2024-25 school year:

The literacy goals of Stewartville School District are directly aligned with the Minnesota READ Act goals. These goals primarily focus on having every child within the school district reading at or above grade level every year throughout their K-12 academic career. For the 2024-2025 school year, the district will make progress toward these goals by solidifying a K-12 infrastructure for continuous improvement, increasing family and community engagement opportunities, strengthening our multi-layered practices and support, consistently using assessment to adjust instruction and academic supports, and adhering to data-based decision making as outlined in the Minnesota Multi-Tiered System of Supports framework. Professional development activities for staff will be focused on structured literacy and standards-based assessment. Through the study of these scientifically-based concepts and structures, the goal is to provide quality training that leads to practical application within the classrooms in order to bolster teaching, learning, assessment, and reporting. From cradle to career, a sustained effort is made by the Stewartville Public Schools to create quality, equitable literacy environments in all of our schools and programs.

The following was implemented or changed to make progress towards the goal(s):

During a thorough review of intervention qualifications and service minutes, it was determined that a more efficient MTSS system could be put into place that would meet best practice requirements, all while servicing more students. The changes that were put into place focused on intentionally servicing students based on skill deficits and in a systematic, tiered manner.

The following describes how Stewartville Public School District (0534-01)'s current student performance differs from the literacy goal detailed in the READ Act:

The goal of this legislation is to have every Minnesota child reading at or above grade level every year, beginning in kindergarten, and to support multilingual learners and students receiving special education services in achieving their individualized reading goals in order to meet grade level proficiency. 26% of our multilingual student population who are assessed via FastBridge, met grade-level benchmarks. 39% of our special education students met or exceeded their annual IEP goal of reading.

Stewartville Public School District (0534-01)'s literacy goal(s) for the 2025-26 school year:

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Stewartville Public Schools strives to accomplish the Minnesota READ Act Goal of every child reading at or above grade-level. Using evidence-based practices defined by the Science of Reading, classrooms are focusing on providing structured instruction, support, and assessment for all levels of learners. Student Literacy Goals and Outcomes: Kindergarten Spring 2025 Result: 51.1% of students met the definition of on track in reading on the Spring 2025 FastBridge earlyReading Letter Names and Letter Sounds assessments in Kindergarten. Spring 2026 Target: +3% growth would indicate difficult, but an attainable goal for students to meet the definition of on track in reading over the Spring 2025 results. Grade 1 Spring 2025 Result: 58.6% of students met the definition of on track in reading on the Spring 2025 FastBridge Fastbridge CBMR assessment. Spring 2026 Target: +3% growth would indicate difficult, but an attainable goal for students to meet the definition of on track in reading over the Spring 2025 results. Grades 2-8 Spring 2025 Result: 65.7% of students met the definition of on track in reading on the Spring 2025 FastBridge aReading assessment in grades 2-8. The development of literacy skills relies on a strong foundation of tier-one instruction. With evidence-based practices as our guiding principle of our core literacy instruction, we ensure all of our classrooms have the ability to immerse every child in opportunities of direct instruction in both large and small group settings. In addition to strong tier-one practices, our building-level data teams focus on developing the reading skills of groups of students who may benefit from additional interventions and supports based on the multi-tiered system of support model.

The MDE approved tool for screening for characteristics of dyslexia for students in grades 4-12 is Capti ReadBasix. Beginning in the 2025-26 school year, this tool must be used to screen students who are not reading at grade level for characteristics of dyslexia.

The following method will be used by Stewartville Public School District (0534-01) to determine which students in grades 4-12 are not reading at grade level:

Students in grades 4-8 will be universally screened in aReading via FastBridge in the fall of 2025. Students who are identified as some risk and high risk will then be screened with the Capti ReadBasix program. Students in grades 9-12 will be reviewed by our high school Intervention Team to determine and identify students who have shown a pattern of reading difficulties during their educational journey. These students will complete the Capti ReadBasix assessment during the Winter testing window.

The plan for both the frequency and timing (e.g. Fall, Winter, Spring) of administration of Capti ReadBasix for students in grades 4-12 who are not reading at grade level is locally determined and includes:

Students in grades 4-8 will take the Capti ReadBasix if their Fall benchmark testing identifies them as some risk or high risk on the FastBridge aReading assessment. Students in grades 9-12 who were identified by the

Intervention Team, will take the Capti ReadBasix during the Winter Benchmark window. Students who fell in this category, and were identified as having characteristics of dyslexia, will take the Capti ReadBasix a second time during the Spring benchmark window to determine growth and progress. Students who took the Capti ReadBasix based on the FastBridge screener, but not determined to show characteristics of dyslexia, will not take the Capti ReadBasix again in the Spring.

8. Data-Based Decision Making for Action

READ Act screening data should be the basis for data-based decision making to determine which students need more support in reading. This could include differentiation of core (Tier 1) instruction, supplemental (Tier 2) or intensive (Tier 3) instruction.

Stewartville Public School District (0534-01) uses the following process and data to assure that evidence-based instruction and intervention matches to a student's needs:

During our tri-annual universal benchmarking screening period, students are assessed in fluency and comprehension to determine skill deficits in reading. Students are identified based on their risk level of reading difficulties. Screening results are analyzed based on current and prior student data in order to determine which students need what level of additional reading support. Students may also be given a diagnostic assessment in order to pinpoint specific skill deficits or learning challenges. Building-level data teams use the results from screeners and diagnostic assessments to select and design interventions that are evidence-based and matched to the needs of the learner.

The processes for monitoring fidelity and differentiating Tier 1 instruction include:

For the school year of 2025-26, classroom teachers in grades K-5 will be creating a structured ELA block that includes the science of reading elements in order to provide high quality instruction with the ability to easily differentiate based on identified skill deficits. With a comprehensive literacy block in the area of phonemic awareness, phonics, word study, comprehension, writing, and targeted small group instruction, students are provided appropriate, explicit, and systematic instruction. Administration may use structured tools while observing reading instruction. These tools may include checklists that focus on observations of teachers appropriately using the curriculum materials, their pacing, instructional strategies, and assessments to guide instruction. Through regular instructional walkthroughs, instructional leaders are able to gather data and provide feedback to support professional growth.

Criteria for entrance into supplemental (Tier 2) and/or intensive (Tier 3) targeted reading intervention include:

Elementary After each benchmark screening window is closed, grade-level teams are led through a data-based decision making process. Students below benchmark are discussed based on level of need. Our K-5 classrooms have adopted the MDE composite scoring criteria in order to prioritize student needs. Students are then categorized based on their previous tiered intervention status. Students who have shown little to no growth in a Tier I setting will first move into a Tier II intervention group. Our district defines Tier II as a small group intervention of 5-7 students of similar skill deficit. This group works on a group-identified intervention during our designated WIN block in the classroom, or another determined location. These interventions are facilitated by a classroom teacher or trained paraprofessional. Our district defines Tier III as a small group intervention of 1-3 students of similar skill deficit. More often than not, the students are placed in a 30 minute intervention group with a licensed reading interventionist, who has completed Orton-Gillingham IMSE training in order to provide those intensive services. **Secondary** After Spring benchmark testing, students in the current grades of

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5-7, will be discussed based on the level of reading intervention needed. Students will be invited to register for the Reading Intervention course for the following school year. This course consists of 14 or less students and focuses on student reading skill deficits. This approach targets students in a Tier II setting, with the flexibility of Tier III intervention being added as needed.

Progress monitoring data collection for students in Tier 2 occurs: Once every two weeks

Progress monitoring data collection for students in Tier 3 occurs: Once a week

The kindergarten - 12th grade progress monitoring protocol that has been established to determine any necessary intensifications or modifications of supplemental (Tier 2) and/or intensive (Tier 3) targeted reading instruction include:

Elementary Tier II students are progress monitored bi-weekly or monthly based on intervention. After 6 weeks, student progress is reviewed to determine future placement. If little to no growth is displayed in the specific Tier II intervention, another Tier II intervention is selected and the 6 week process repeats itself. After two Tier II interventions have shown little progress, the student may be determined to need a more intensive intervention through our Tier III services. Tier III students are progress monitored weekly and data is reviewed after 10 weeks of completion. The student may remain in Tier III for an intensive continuation, or be shifted back to a Tier II based on significant progress. Tier III students who complete 20 weeks and show little to no growth, are shared with the building problem-solving team for further consideration of support. Secondary In grades 6-8 students who are enrolled in the Reading Intervention course are monitored for growth in comprehension and fluency once a month.

Criteria for exit from supplemental (Tier 2) and/or intensive (Tier3) targeted reading intervention include:

Tier II data is reviewed every 6 weeks. Students who are showing growth that places them at grade level or slightly below may be exited due to the classroom teacher's ability to provide an added boost during Tier I instruction or small group reading rotations. Tier III data is reviewed every 10 weeks. Students who are showing aggressive growth may be exited to a Tier II small group in order to maintain progress and be monitored for literacy retention. At this time, we do not have a criteria in place for Tier III students to be exited out of an intervention program completely without progressing to a less intensive intervention program.

The following support will be provided to teachers who do not complete the approved training at the vendor recommended 80% proficiency level:

Stewartville Public Schools will respond with a structured, supportive, and growth-oriented plan to ensure both teacher success and student learning. Building administrators will create an individualized improvement plan that focuses on the area of literacy instruction that was below the standard. This plan will include clear goals, timelines, and measurable outcomes. Individuals will be provided with instructional coaching and mentorships for regular, instructional-embedded support to build confidence and skills. Building administrators will conduct frequent classroom walkthroughs with formative, non-evaluative feedback.

The following fidelity data is collected to ensure that elementary teachers are able to implement explicit, systematic, evidence-based instruction in the five areas of phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension:

Through our district observation protocols, we use tools that assess whether instruction follows an appropriate sequence and pacing, includes clear, explicit teaching of skills, provides sufficient modeling, guided and independent practice, and differentiates based on student need.

Based on the results of the fidelity data, the following coaching support and feedback is implemented to ensure that all elementary teachers are able to implement explicit, systematic, evidence-based instruction in the following five areas of instruction: phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension:

Based on the results of our district observation system, feedback is provided through pre-determined instructional indicators in reading: use of instructional routines, accurate and consistent use of terminology and materials, and time-on-task dedicated to each of the five components of reading instruction.

The following changes in instructional practices have impacted students :

Small group instruction is now focused on instructing based on skill deficits in order to provide targeted reading instruction. This school year we have seen the greatest impact in our tiered reading services. More students have been able to get the targeted instruction and it is creating an instructional shift in our classrooms on how

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differentiated instruction is occurring.

Stewartville Public School District (0534-01) has implemented the following professional development and support for teachers around culturally responsive practices:

On-going coaching support for implementation of culturally responsive literacy practices may include some of the following: Modeling and co-teaching literacy strategies that affirm student identity. Facilitation of reflective PLC discussions focused on student engagement, belonging, and achievement. And teachers using observation and reflection tools to self-assess the cultural responsiveness of their instruction.
