

2012 Inductees	
<p>Harvey Naasz</p> 	<p>Harvey Naasz is considered one of the most respected football coaches in the history of South Dakota football. Harvey graduated from Mobridge High School and then from USD in 1963.</p> <p>He began teaching and coaching in Winner in 1970 and continued for 33 years. Harvey had an amazing 26 years as Head Football coach with a record of 170-52-4. During Harvey's reign as head football coach, his teams won 3 State Football Championships in 1981, 1987 and 1989 along with Runner Up in 1986. His teams also were Big Dakota Champions in 1982, 1984, 1986 and 1987. Another accomplishment of Harvey's was having undefeated teams in 1980 and 1981.</p> <p>Harvey was voted Football Coach of the Year 4 times by other state coaches. He was also named the SD Athletic Director of the Year in 1996 and in the same year, was given the SDHSAA Distinguished Service Award in coaching. Harvey has been inducted into the SDHSAA Hall of Fame, SDFBCA Hall of Fame and the National Coaches Hall of Fame.</p> <p>Harvey is married to his wife Karen and together they have 3 sons; Bart, Brian and Brad.</p>
<p>Bill Pistulka</p> 	<p>Bill Pistulka graduated from Fairfax High School in 1955 and from Southern State Teachers College in 1959. In 1965, he received his Master's Degree from South Dakota State College.</p> <p>Bill started teaching at Winner High School in 1959 and continued for 35 years. During his years at WHS, Bill taught social studies and industrial arts. He served as the head basketball coach from 1961-1964 and as the head track coach from 1961-1975. He was credited with starting the first cross-country program at WHS. In 1968, he was named the first athletic director of the school, a position he held for 18 years.</p> <p>Bill was a member of the South Dakota Board of Control and served as president of the Athletic Directors Association for 1979 and 1980. He was inducted into the South Dakota Athletic Directors Hall of Fame in 1986 and in 1994 was honored for 25 years of service by the Industrial Technology Teachers Association. Bill was inducted into the Southern State Teachers College Pointer Hall of Fame in 1996 and into the Fairfax Wall of Fame in 2012.</p> <p>Bill was married to his wife Betty and they have 3 children; Lisa, Merideth and Bill.</p>

<p>Jane Nicolaisen</p> 	<p>Jane Nicolaisen graduated from Winner High School in 1976 and from Norther State University in 1980. While attending WHS, Jane played in the 1975 State Basketball Tournament in Aberdeen, SD. The team had a 7<sup>th</sup> place finish. Jane scored 70 points during the tournament with a 31 point game against Lead. Jane was selected to the All Tournament Team and was also selected to the All State 2<sup>nd</sup> Team. She also lettered in track 2 years and placed at the State Track Meet in 1976 in discus.</p> <p>During Jane's college career, she lettered for four seasons in basketball and softball and three years in volleyball. Jane was named the NSU Female Athlete of the year in 1976-1977. She scored 1,375 career points and ranks 8<sup>th</sup> among NSU's career scoring leaders. Jane was inducted into the NSU Hall of Fame in 1996.</p> <p>Jane earned a physical education teaching degree in 1980 and has been the office manager at Northwestern Mutual in Aberdeen, SD for 31 years.</p>
<p>Larry Frank</p> 	<p>Larry Frank, one of Winner's finest all-around athletes, graduated from WHS in 1968. Larry started in basketball and football for 2 years. He was named 3<sup>rd</sup> team All-State in basketball in 1968. It was in track that Larry Frank really excelled. At one time he held the school records in the low hurdles, high hurdles, high jump, long jump, triple jump and pole vault. His records in the low hurdles, triple jump and pole vault still stand today. At the State Track Championships, Larry placed 4<sup>th</sup> in the low hurdles in 1968 and placed in the pole vault 3 times, 4<sup>th</sup> in 1966, 1<sup>st</sup> in 1967 and 1968. His school best of 14'4 3/4" was also a state record at the time. In 1968, he competed in the National Junior Olympics and finished fourth in the pole vault, becoming the first South Dakotan to ever to place in the meet.</p> <p>After graduation, Larry went to SDSU and had an exceptional career as a member of the Jackrabbit track team for four years. He won seven North Central Conference championships in the pole vault and was a national champion in the event in 1970. He became the first South Dakotan to clear 16'. Larry Frank is a member of the SDSU Hall of Fame.</p> <p>He is employed as an Investor and Real Estate Development in Chandler, AZ. He and his wife, Pamela, have two sons, Jamie and Robbie.</p>




<p>Sam Goodhope</p> 	<p>Sam Goodhope graduated from Winner High School in 1986. He participated in basketball, football and track for four years. Sam was All Conference Basketball in 1985 and 1986, All Conference Football in 1985 and All State Basketball in 1986. In 1986, he was named to the Argus Leader Top 5, named South Dakota Mr. Basketball, was Player of the Year and Converse All-American Honorable Mention.</p> <p>Sam attended USD and was a 3 year starter in basketball. In 1990, he was honored with being named NCC All Tournament Team, NCAA Regional Tournament Team, and Academic All Conference.</p> <p>Sam is currently practicing law in Sioux Falls and is a partner in the firm of Kadin, Kunstle &amp; Goodhope LLP. He is married to his wife Laura and together they have 4 children; Chloe, Anna, Sadie Mae and Charlotte.</p>
<p>Jim Calhoon</p> 	<p>Jim Calhoon graduated from Winner High School in 1956. After graduation, he went to work on the family ranch while coaching baseball and basketball at Ideal, Carter and Hamill grade schools. At the age of 32, Jim started college at Northern State College in Aberdeen, SD. While attending college, he was an assistant coach in basketball and football and a head coach in baseball.</p> <p>Jim was a coach for 44 years along with being a teacher, principal and athletic director. Jim's coaching record for his boys' and girls' basketball teams were 513 wins and 197 losses. His basketball teams made 9 state tournament appearances with the girls making 4 consecutive trips between the years of 1985-1989. Jim's overall baseball record is 627 wins and 246 losses and had 7 trips to the state tournament, winning the State A Teener tournament in 1972.</p> <p>In 1995, Jim received the Northern State University Alumni Coach of the year. He received the SDHSCA Distinguished Service Award and was named SD Basketball Coaches Association Region Coach of the year 11 times. Jim was included into the SDHSCA Hall of Fame in 1999 and into the South Dakota Basketball Coaches Hall of Shrine in 2004. Him and his wife Linda have 6 children.</p>

<p>Gordon Horgen</p> 	<p>Gordon Horgen taught at Winner High School from 1961-2002. He was an outstanding physics and chemistry teacher and was easily recognized wearing his trademark, white lab coat. Mr. Horgen was also the first computer teacher at WHS. In 1971, Gordon was named the SD Outstanding Young Educator and in 1987, he was presented the SD Outstanding Physical Science Teacher Award by the SD Academy of Science. He was one of 2 South Dakotans invited in 1990 to attend the launch of the Discovery space shuttle at Cape Canaveral. After his retirement, Mr. Horgen continued as a substitute teacher for several years and also became an ordained minister. Mr. Horgen was described as the consummate teacher always looking for a way to reach students and help them to find success.</p> <p>Gordon helped to start the Community Connections Center and served on the original board of directors, including serving as president for many years. He was also on the Southern Plains Behavior Health board for 25 years and served as president for 20 years. For all his work, Governor Dennis Daugaard named September 5, 2013, as Gordon Horgen Day in South Dakota.</p> <p>Gordon is married to Joyce and together they had one son, Bret.</p>
<p>Jim Trego</p> 	<p>Jim Trego graduated from Winner High School in 1971. In 1970, he was a state champion in cross country and in the 2 mile run where he broke the state track meet record. After 42 years, he still holds the school record in the 2 mile and 1 mile run. At one time, he held the record for the 800 meter, 2 mile relay and the medley relay.</p> <p>Jim graduated from SDSU in 1975 where he ran on 4 nationally ranked cross country teams and was All Conference in track and field. After graduation from SDSU, Jim joined the Air Force. He eventually worked at the Air Force Academy as a coach for cross country and track and then as Assistant Director of Athletics. He then moved on to be the Associate Director of Athletics at Baylor University for 16 years and is not back at the Academy as their Senior Associate Director of Athletics</p> <p>Jim is married to Tammy and together they have 2 children: Bayley and Tyler.</p>





<p>Don Van Cleave</p> 	<p>Don Van Cleave began working at the Winner School District as the high school guidance counselor in 1970. He served the district for 26 years and retired in 1996. Along with his counselor duties, he was also the Director of Fine Arts Activities. He directed 24 plays during his career at WHS. He started and advised Stage Fright drama club in 1983 and through 1996.</p> <p>Don was instrumental in organizing the Winner Community Playhouse. This was due to his leadership, persistence, organizational skills, dedication and unselfish service. After Don's retirement, he continued to direct plays and devoted time daily to the operation of the playhouse facility. Along with his fine arts accomplishments, he also served as the first board President of the Rosebud Area Guidance Center (which is now Southern Plains Behavioral Health Services) and served on the advisory board for the Winner Nursing Home. He directed 52 plays for the Winner Community Playhouse. Nearly all the plays included cast members from high school students.</p> <p>Don is married to Marian and together they have 4 children: David, Kathy, Deborah and Kevin.</p>
<p>Orville Voss</p> 	<p>Orville Voss attended Winner High School. He was active in baseball, football and music. He was drafted his senior year of high school and served in the 136th Infantry Division in campaigns in Italy and France, where he earned the Purple Heart and Bronze Star. He attended the University of Nebraska where he earned both a BA and MA in music and music education. He worked at the Winner School District from 1951-1961.</p> <p>Mr. Voss was a very talented, influential and dedicated band director. He instilled pride in Winner High School, but the gifts of his talent and ability he gave to his students were immeasurable. Orville was very invested in the music program often taking out personal loans to help fund his program. The Winner High School Music Student of the Year Award is given in memory of Orville Voss.</p> <p>Orville was married to Jacqueline and together they had 2 children: Wendy and Steve.</p>

<p>Frank Leahy</p> 	<p>Frank Leahy grew up in Winner through his junior year of high school. He played football, baseball and basketball. After graduating high school, he attended the University of Notre Dame. He played tackle for the Fighting Irish when they won 2 National Championships in 1929 and 1930.</p> <p>After graduating, Frank held various coaching positions at Georgetown, Michigan State and Fordham. His first head coaching job was at Boston College in 1939 where he led the team to a Sugar Bowl victory in 1941. He then headed to Notre Dame to take the head coaching position and led the team to a National Championship in 1943, 1946, 1947, and 1949. He coached 4 Heisman trophy winners and finished his tenure at Notre Dame with a record of 87-11-9. Leahy was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame and into the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame. He was number 2 on Sports Illustrated's list of 50 greatest South Dakota Sports figures. Frank Leahy's legacy is remembered to this day in Winner as the baseball field is named "Leahy Bowl" and as you drive into Winner there is a huge sign which reads "Home of Frank Leahy".</p> <p>He was married to Florence and together they had 8 children: Frank Jr., Sue, Florence, Jerry, Jim, Fred, Mary and Chris.</p>
<p>Ben Viedt</p> 	<p>Ben Viedt graduated from Winner High School in 1945. Ben was the mayor of Winner from 1956-1960. He worked at KWYR from 1958 until the time of his death in 1987. Ben was instrumental in getting the Winner Quarterback Club started and in having the first Winner High School football stadium built. He also served on the Board of Education.</p> <p>In the late 1960's, he opened a business called "The Cue". It was a place for kids to hang out and play pool and ping pong. Ben was a Boy Scout leader for Troop 100 for 15 years. Both his father and his son were also leaders of the same troop. Ben was known for his tremendous sense of humor and his ability to lead people. He is also remembered for his trademark spring poem, "Oh Spring, oh Spring" and his reference to the flag pole during his weather reports by peering out his window at the radio station.</p> <p>Ben was married to Lois and together they had 3 children, Dan, Melody and Nanette.</p>

<p>Glenn Carlson</p> 	<p>Glenn Carlson began teaching in Winner in 1973 and continued through 2006. During his tenure, he taught mainly Math classes along with some Science and PE classes, Mr. Carlson has touched lives of countless students who still hold him in high regard. Glenn was a 4 time All-American athlete from SDSU and held the high hurdle record for over 30 years and was member of record relay teams. He brought his knowledge with him to Winner and continued to share his expertise with the Winner athletes for close to 40 years. He helped coach track, football, basketball and cross country during his career and has continued to be an assistant coach for the HS football team and track team.</p> <p>Coach Carlson is a hands on coach that can be found on the field with the kids at a meet getting them ready for an event, cheering them on during and offering kind words and encouragement after. There have also been many awards given to Mr. Carlson, including: twice named teacher of the year, twice named Parade Marshal for the homecoming parade, Spirit of Howard Schramm Award, Bill Pistulka Award and the 1st recipient of the Winner Quarterback Club Volunteer of the Year.</p> <p>Glenn is married to Rebecca and together they have 2 daughters: Lisa and Carrie.</p>
<p>Donny Godel</p> 	<p>Donny Godel graduated from Winner High School in 1988. He was a 3 sport, 9 time letter winner for WHS. Donny was part of the Warriors 1987 undefeated football season and 11A State football championship team. He served as captain, quarterback, defensive back, and was the punter and extra point kicker. Donny set the school interception record. In basketball, he was the captain of the Warrior District Championship squad. He earned 1st team class "A" All-State honors as well as All-Conference and a "Mr. Basketball" candidate. His 53 points vs. Miller set the single game school record. In track and field, he was a member of the state 2 mile relay.</p> <p>Donny was also active in baseball and was named the SD Class "B" Player of the Year as a pitcher and shortstop in Legion baseball. After graduation, he attended Northern State University. Donny became captain of both the Wolves' basketball and baseball teams. He earned All-Conference and All-District in both sports. He was inducted into the SD State Amateur Basketball Hall of Fame in 2014.</p> <p>Donny is the son of Phyllis and Donald Godel.</p>

<p>Janet Bruun</p> 	<p>Janet Schramm Bruun graduated from WHS in 1956. She went on to graduate from SDSU in 1961 with a major in Spanish and minors in German and Business. In 1969, she received her Master's Degree in Business Education from USD. Mrs. Bruun started teaching at Winner High School in 1964 and continued to do so until 2002. Over the years, she taught Spanish and Business classes. Senora Bruun took her classes on trips to Mexico. In 1970, she started the Warriorettes dance team and was the advisor for 32 years. There were 407 girls in Warriorettes while she was the advisor.</p> <p>She is a member of the Trinity Lutheran Church, NEA, SDEA, WEA, SDFLA, Friends of Library, Winner Community Playhouse, and the Quarterback Club. Although Janet is involved with several organizations, she rarely misses a WHS sporting event. She has received numerous awards over the years: Outstanding Educator, nominated for National Teacher of the Year, listed in Who's Who for Teachers, Parade Marshal of the Homecoming Parade, Outstanding Teacher, Bill Pistulka Friends of Athletics Award, State Hershey Track Volunteer Award, and Friend of Basketball Award from the SD Coaches Association.</p> <p>Janet is married to Carroll and together they have 3 children: Johnyne, Jacey and Jad.</p>
<p>Kirk Bainter</p> 	<p>Kirk Bainter graduated from Winner High School in 1982. He competed in many sports throughout high school such as: football, wrestling, track, baseball, golf and swim team. Kirk was a 2 year starter for the football team that went undefeated for 2 consecutive seasons in 1980 and 1981, which included the very first 11 man championship in 1981. As a sprinter on the WHS track team, he was a state "A" qualifier in the open 400 twice. Kirk was a 3 time State "A" wrestling champion in 1980, 1981 and 1982. He was named the Class "A" outstanding wrestler at the 1982 State Wrestling Tournament. As a senior, Kirk received 3rd team High School All American and then went on to represent South Dakota with the USA wrestling team traveling to Germany for the cultural exchange trip.</p> <p>He then went onto Northern State University where he was a part of Wolves wrestling team for 1 year. <p>Duke Nedved</p> 	<p>Leland "Duke" Nedved graduated from Wagner High School in 1958 where he earned all state honors in football. After high school, he enlisted in the United States Army. He was honorably discharged in 1961 at the rank of Corporal and went on to receive his Bachelor of Science Degree for teaching in 1966 from Southern State Teachers College in Springfield, SD. He also played football and earned SDIC Conference honors.</p> <p>Leland then dedicated his entire 35 year teaching career (1966-2001) to Winner High School. He taught many science classes and coached a variety of sports. Leland challenged his students and athletes making him a great student council advisor/activities advisor for many years. He guided students and council members through many demanding and successful homecoming activities. His primary goal was always maintaining the honesty and integrity of the selection process for Homecoming Royalty. Leland also devoted 28 years of military service to the South Dakota Army National Guard. He retired in 1987 at the rank of 1st Sergeant while serving the 730th Support Medical Company in Winner. Leland was a leader among his soldiers which earned him numerous military awards including "Soldier of the Year".</p> <p>Leland was married to Margo and together they had 3 children: Troy, Shane and Derrick.</p>

He then enlisted in the Army for 2 years including a tour of duty in Korea. He was decorated with a Bronze Star, V Device, Korean War Medal, Good Conduct Medal and the Purple Heart. After returning to Winner to join his parents in operating Grossenburg Implement, Inc., under Gene's leadership, Grossenburg Implement grew to be the largest John Deere dealership in the Minneapolis District. It has grown to employ 165 employees and has 7 locations. 


