This month, our AP Economics students participated in our annual Urban Plan Presentations, and they did not disappoint. Over the past few weeks, they were given the task of redeveloping a five and a half block district in the fictional city of Yorktown. Through the process they had to create a proposal that met the specific financial, social, political, and environmental goals of the city, while balancing their own company's vision and profit margins. At the end of the project, they had to present their proposals to a "city council" made up of real developers, brokers, and architects from our community. Some of which have been in the industry longer than our students have been alive. I am pleased to share that our students rose to the challenge and produced some truly great proposals. Most impressive was their ability to work together and lean on each other's strengths through the process. After the presentation, the council decided on the proposal they believed best met the city's goals and awarded them the contract. This year's winners were Jacob Hatanaka, Phuong Duong, Kainoa Mackowiak, and Takehiro Yaguchi representing Jakput Construction. The council was so impressed with their proposal and ability to deliver it. One developer even expressed his willingness to hire some of them if he wasn't retired. All in all, it was a great year of Urban Plan and a great experience for our students.

High School Teams to Compete in the 2024 Hawai'i LifeSmarts State Competition

HONOLULU – The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) Business Registration Division and Insurance Division, and Hawai'i Credit Union League (HCUL) announce the top-scoring high school teams for the online portion of the annual Hawai'i LifeSmarts State Competition.

Teams from **Kalani, Maryknoll and Waipahu** high schools have earned their spot to compete at the in-person State Competition, which will be on Friday, February 2, 2024, from 9:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Campus Center Ballroom. The event will be open to the public.

Students will complete individual assessment tests prior to the State Competition, then they will test their team skills through a "speed smarts" activity and gameshow-style buzzer rounds at the in-person State Competition. The winner of the competition will represent Hawai'i at the National LifeSmarts Competition in San Diego, California from April 18 – 21, 2024.

"This is a big year for Hawai'i LifeSmarts," said Securities Commissioner Ty Nohara. "Hawai'i currently holds the national championship title as we proudly celebrate 20 years of sponsoring this program in the state. Thank you to all the coaches and students who participated in the online competition, and congratulations to the four teams moving on to the state competition!"

LifeSmarts is a consumer education program designed to teach students in grades 6-12 about personal finance, health and safety, the environment, technology, and consumer rights and responsibilities. The Hawai'i LifeSmarts program is locally sponsored by the DCCA's Business Registration Division and Insurance Division, in partnership with HCUL, and is run by the National Consumers League.

AHERA

In 1986, Congress passed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) which mandated the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule, 40 CFR Part 763. It requires all primary and secondary school buildings to be inspected by AHERA accredited inspectors and to identify all asbestos-containing building materials. The rule further requires the development of a management plan by an AHERA accredited management planner that is based on the findings of the inspection. The management plan outlines our intent in controlling the potential for exposure to asbestos fibers in our school. In February 2001, Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 11-502 was adopted by the Hawaii State Legislature. These rules essentially mirror the requirements of the AHERA regulations. In both cases, the rule requires our school to notify parents, teachers, and employees of the presence and status of asbestos containing material in our school buildings.

The initial inspection of our school was conducted in 1958 and identifies some asbestos-containing materials. Since that time, we continue to conduct periodic surveillances and triennial re-inspections to ensure that the asbestos-containing materials remain in good condition and do not pose a hazard to our students and staff. An asbestos management plan was drafted based on our initial inspection and submitted to the Hawaii State Department of Health. It outlines in detail the methods we will use to maintain the material in a safe manner. The management plan is updated regularly as asbestos is removed or conditions change. A copy of the management plan is on file in the administrative office and is available for your review during our regular school hours.
