Graffiti

Parents, please talk to your child(ren) regarding graffiti on campus. We need your help to keep our campus clean. This is also an opportunity to remind your child(ren) that as responsible citizens, they should report students who vandalize property in order to keep our community clean and safe for everyone. Identified graffiti artists will be referred to HPD for possible arrest and restitution. Recommended restitution will include cleaning all graffiti on-campus for the rest of the school year.

Furthermore, HPD is encouraging students that walk to Kahala Mall after school to report graffiti to the City and County of Honolulu via the 311 (non-emergency HPD number).

History of Student CrimeStoppers Honolulu

Officer Larry WIEDA started the first Student CrimeStoppers program at Fairview High School in Boulder Colorado in 1983. Since then, Officer WIEDA has replied to thousands of requests for information from schools all over the U.S., Guam, Canada and England. The Board of Directors of Crime Stoppers Honolulu, Inc. approved a pilot program for Student CrimeStoppers in March, 1997. It was tailored to the needs of the communities on O'ahu and designed to aid law enforcement in reducing crime on school campuses and in the nearby community.

The first five schools were Aiea, Farrington, Leilehua and McKinley High Schools, and Dole Middle School. The program was expanded in February, 1999 as part of an agreement between Crime Stoppers Honolulu, Inc., the Hawai'i State Board of Education and the Honolulu Police Department to make the Student CrimeStoppers available to every public and private middle and high school on O'ahu. Ten thousand posters were distributed to the schools to help explain the program.

Today, there are more than 57 schools from which CrimeStoppers Honolulu routinely receives information about problems and potential crimes.

Federal Impact Aid

Campus Safety

The Hawaii Department of Education Safety, Security and Emergency Preparedness Branch is responsible for the security of Department campuses. Our schools and state offices are secured as best as possible to prevent theft, vandalism, trespassing and acts of violence. Annual training is provided for all security personnel with continued research into security best practices and the latest technology.

School and student safety is a responsibility for all involved — administrators, staff, teachers, students, families, law enforcement and the broader community. Safety and security are necessary in order for learning to take place.

Closed Campus

Kalani is a closed campus. The Hawaii Kai entrance to our campus is locked from 8:30am – 1:30pm. Security is posted at the Ewa entrance and the back parking lot and we will monitor all cars entering campus.

Uber Eats and other food delivery companies will be stopped and turned away (School Food Services Guidelines).

Chapter 19

In order to keep our schools safe, rules have been established relating to student misconduct; these rules also govern searches of students and seizures of property. Hawaii Administrative Rules, [Chapter 19](#), are derived from state law. It's important that students and parents review this information to be aware of the consequences of a Chapter 19 violation.

Parking Guidelines : To ensure safety, and security for our faculty, staff and students, all student vehicles are required to have a parking permit. Student vehicles parked on campus without a parking permit will result in the following actions: parent/student meeting, student's vehicle will not be allowed on campus.

Student Parking is around the track (lower campus) Students are NOT allowed to park in the teachers' parking lot.

Student Parking is on a First Come/First Serve basis.

Once the spaces allocated for student parking are filled, students will need to park on the street.

Health and Safety Guidelines

Per Hawaii State Department of Education's Health and Safety guidelines

(<https://www.hawaiipublicschools.org/DOE%20Forms/COVID-19%20Health%20and%20Safety%20Guidance.pdf>), if your child has symptoms of COVID-19 or other illness, he/she should stay home and get tested for COVID-19. Please apply the criteria below before returning to school.

COVID-19 SYMPTOMS OR POSITIVE COVID-19 REST RESULT

(Must meet ALL criteria to return to school/work.)

- At least 5 full days have passed since symptoms first appeared or, if asymptomatic, 5 days have passed since the positive test was collected; (Day 0 = symptoms onset or test date. Return no sooner than Day 6.)
- No fever for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication;
- Symptoms have improved; and
- Must wear a mask indoors at school on days 6-10. If unable or unwilling to wear a mask, must remain in isolation for 10 days, regardless of vaccination status.

COVID-19-like Symptoms, Low Clinical Suspicion for COVID-19, and NO known Exposure to COVID-19

(Must meet ALL criteria to return to school/work.)

- Symptoms were likely associated with something other than COVID-19 (e.g. allergy);
- No known exposure to someone with COVID-19 at school or other location;
- Symptoms have improved;
- No fever for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication; and
- Negative COVID-19 test* **OR** clearance note from a licensed medical profession.

*A COVID-19 test that is approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) under Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) may be used to fulfill the test requirement; including most self-tests. The parent/legal guardian may verbally attest to the negative COVID-19 test result; documentation to the school is not required.

AHERA

In 1986, Congress passed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) which mandated the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule, 40 CFR Part 763. It requires all primary and secondary school buildings to be inspected by AHERA accredited inspectors and to identify all asbestos-containing building materials. The rule further requires the development of a management plan by an AHERA accredited management planner that is based on the findings of the inspection. The management plan outlines our intent in controlling the potential for exposure to asbestos fibers in our school. In February 2001, Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 11-502 was adopted by the Hawaii State Legislature. These rules essentially mirror the requirements of the AHERA regulations. In both cases, the rule requires our school to notify parents, teachers, and employees of the presence and status of asbestos containing material in our school buildings.

The initial inspection of our school was conducted in 1958 and identifies some asbestos-containing materials. Since that time, we continue to conduct periodic surveillances and triennial re-inspections to ensure that the asbestos-containing materials remain in good condition and do not pose a hazard to our students and staff. An asbestos management plan was drafted based on our initial inspection and submitted to the Hawaii State Department of Health. It outlines in detail the methods we will use to maintain the material in a safe manner. The management plan is updated regularly as asbestos is removed or conditions change. A copy of the management plan is on file in the administrative office and is available for your review during our regular school hours.
