## **State Co-Champions : Urban Planning In-Person Competition**

After a full day of competing, they emerged tied with students from Iolani for first place and both teams will represent the State in the National Championship next month. Urban Plan is a classroom-based learning curriculum developed for high school juniors and seniors. The program is currently reaching almost 4,000 students per year in 40 high schools in 30 cities through ULI's network of District Councils. In the 15 class hours of the curriculum, students learn about land use and its related disciplines in business, city planning, real estate, architecture, and law.

Students form development teams and respond to an RFP to redevelop a 5 1/2 block site in a fictional city. Each team member assumes one of five development roles and together the team develops a financial proforma and physical model of their plan. Once complete, each team presents their proposal to a mock City Council who then awards the 'development contract' to the winning team. Through the process, students discover the dynamic fundamental challenges of development: how market forces such as supply and demand clash and collaborate with non-market forces like politics and regulation to create the built environment. Urban Land Institute volunteer facilitators challenge the students to think more critically about Urban Plan issues and the specific civic responsibilities that comes with each plan. A big mahalo to Coach Mike Zane and special thanks to Chase Sumida and Kenny Okawa for providing guiding critiques to our team in their preparation for this event. Aside from their performance award, Kalani's", kids continue to be recognized for their great character in being very respectful, appreciative, and welcoming.

### **Kalani High School teacher named Milken Educators of Hawai'i's 2022 Teacher of Promise**

HONOLULU — Kalani High School math teacher Tristan Nguyen was honored today (April 21) with the 2022 state Teacher of Promise award. The Teacher of Promise award is granted annually by the [Milken Educators of Hawai'i](#) — a select group of Hawai'i educators who have been recognized by the nationally renowned [Milken Family Foundation](#) — to a classroom teacher for demonstration of outstanding commitment and potential during their first three years with the Hawai'i State Department of Education.

Nguyen was awarded a \$2,000 reward for professional development purposes, sponsored by the Hawaii USA Federal Credit Union, in front of his colleagues and students during a surprise ceremony at Kalani High today.

Nguyen, who spent his first year in the classroom teaching math to special education students, is known to prioritize a strong teacher-student relationship. He openly communicates with his students, forming connections to help inspire and motivate them academically and challenges his students to connect classroom lessons to the outside world. His efforts help him to target the individual needs of his students, minimizing the need for outside disciplinary and motivational interventions.

“The way I see it, good teaching is about making the kids feel comfortable — especially with subjects like math and science, it can be tough,” Nguyen said after receiving his award. “It’s about making sure they feel welcome, that they are comfortable talking with me and are relaxed in my class so that way, when it comes to content, they are not afraid to speak up.”

Another notable attribute of Nguyen’s teaching style is the way that he embraces professional development and teacher collaboration to find innovative ways to increase the impact he has on student achievement. Over the course of his three years with the HIDOE, Nguyen has attended every district math teacher workshop offered. When his class transitioned to distance learning during the peak of the pandemic, Nguyen worked with his students to see what support they needed and evaluated how he could best provide it. In collaboration with other teachers in the math department, he designed a synchronous curriculum using an interactive whiteboard app on the iPad.

Kalani High School Principal Mitchell Otani attributes much of Nguyen’s success to his character. “Mr. Nguyen is a gem and a very valuable member of our staff,” Otani said. “He brings to the table friendship, loyalty, cooperation, industriousness and enthusiasm. The sky’s the limit for this young man and I am looking forward to his continuous improvement as he builds his toolbox of strategies in support of his students and his colleagues.”

Beyond the classroom Nguyen is often seen going out of his way to provide extra support to students. He regularly helps to tutor students at school-wide study halls and extends his own assistance to students beyond school hours. He also plays an active role in the school’s math department, helping to develop and conduct assessments where he gathers data on current practices, shares and provides strategies to achieve better results, and organizes data to help teachers to modify instructional practices to increase student achievement.

Overall, Nguyen’s greatest motivation is his students. “Ultimately, it’s all about supporting the students and coming in and seeing the smiles on their faces,” Nguyen said. “That’s what really counts. That’s the most rewarding thing at the end of the day.”

Established in 2007, the Teacher of Promise award alternates annually between elementary and secondary teachers with the state winner selected from a group of HIDOE complex area honorees.

## **COVID INFORMATION**

### **COVID Protocols - Of Utmost Importance**

**In order to keep Kalani safe, please notify the Main Office (305-0500) if someone in your household has tested positive for COVID-19 or if he/she is a close contact of someone who has tested positive. This will enable Kalani High School to put our health and safety protocols into action – protocols that will keep our community of learners safe and healthy. Thank you for your help and support.**

### **Screening begins in the home.**

Families are the first line of defense against COVID19 and play a vital role in maintaining safety on campus. The number one safety measure during this time is to keep your child at home if they are sick.

### **Students need to wear masks, wash hands often and stay home if feeling sick.**

We also understand that there are families with household members that are in the high-risk category. To help to control transmission and potential future outbreaks, we must all do our part to adhere with State Department of Health recommendations and regulations. Moreover, there may be times when we ask families to comply with broader safety measures and we appreciate your cooperation in this regard. Thank you (in advance) for your cooperation and compliance with our safety measures to mitigate the spread of COVID19. If your child is sick, or if anyone in your family is sick, please keep them at home.

- Please take your child to a doctor so they can be tested and treated.
- Get a clearance from your doctor for your child to return to school.
- If your child displays symptoms of an illness, especially a fever, they will be isolated from other students and be sent home immediately from the health room.
- Please make sure the school has contact information for someone who is available to pick up your child immediately.
- Whether your child is physically in school or if they are doing schoolwork on a computer at home, attendance is very important.
- Look out for negative changes in behavior or emotional response due to stresses caused by the current health situation

## Miscellaneous

### AHERA

In 1986, Congress passed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) which mandated the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule, 40 CFR Part 763. It requires all primary and secondary school buildings to be inspected by AHERA accredited inspectors and to identify all asbestos-containing building materials. The rule further requires the development of a management plan by an AHERA accredited management planner that is based on the findings of the inspection. The management plan outlines our intent in controlling the potential for exposure to asbestos fibers in our school. In February 2001, Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 11-502 was adopted by the Hawaii State Legislature. These rules essentially mirror the requirements of the AHERA regulations. In both cases, the rule requires our school to notify parents, teachers, and employees of the presence and status of asbestos containing material in our school buildings.

The initial inspection of our school was conducted in 1958 and identifies some asbestos-containing materials. Since that time, we continue to conduct periodic surveillances and triennial re-inspections to ensure that the asbestos-containing materials remain in good condition and do not pose a hazard to our students and staff. An asbestos management plan was drafted based on our initial inspection and submitted to the Hawaii State Department of Health. It outlines in detail the methods we will use to maintain the material in a safe manner. The management plan is updated regularly as asbestos is removed or conditions change. A copy of the management plan is on file in the administrative office and is available for your review during our regular school hours. ### FERPA and HIPAA

#### Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law enacted in 1974 that protects the privacy of student education records. FERPA applies to any public or private elementary, secondary, or post-secondary school and any state or local education agency that receives funds under an applicable program of the US Department of Education. The Act serves two primary purposes. It gives parents or eligible students control over their educational records, and it prohibits educational institutions from disclosing “personally identifiable information in education records” without the written consent of an eligible student, or if the student is a minor, the student’s parents (20 U.S.C.S. § 1232g(b)).

#### Parents’ or Eligible Students’ Rights

Parents or eligible students have the right to halt the release of personally identifiable information. Schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student’s education record. Schools that fail to comply with FERPA risk losing federal funding.

#### The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA)

The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) law was established in 1996 to set national standards for the security, confidentiality, and conveyance of personal health information. Under the HIPAA Privacy Rule, all healthcare practices and professionals and school officials are required to protect and secure protected health information (PHI). If you run are a healthcare professional who’s planning to run a healthcare practice, it is vital that you familiarize yourself with the HIPAA law.

#### The following are the things addressed in the HIPAA law that you should know Privacy

The HIPAA Privacy Rule was put in place to regulate the use and disclosure of PHI held by healthcare practices and professionals. This rule requires healthcare practices and professionals to take appropriate measures to protect the privacy of their patients’ personal health information. The information, both paper and electronic, that should be safeguarded includes both patients’ medical records and payment records. The HIPAA privacy rule gives patients’ control over their health information.
