Six ambitious Kalani High School students will conduct sophisticated astronomical research using some of the world's most powerful telescopes. The road to Harvard paved with many thanks

This piece is a 700-word column 26 inches long, and if Kalani High School senior Daniel Huang had his way, all of it would be devoted to acknowledging and thanking his parents and the long litany of teachers, counselors, coaches, advisers and others who have helped him along the way.

So, thank you, Andy and Iris Huang, for years of loving support and sacrifice. Merci beaucoup, curriculum coordinator Leslie Hamasaki for the years of guidance and daily support. Grazie, Susan Arashiro and Sandra Yoshida, for your hard work in preparing students to apply to college. Gracias, arigato and danke kindly, dear tennis coaches, church leaders, youth symphony directors, violin and oboe teachers, and all ye manner of extracurricular club officials. Daniel Huang is forever in your debt. Now, someone, please, teach the boy to brag a little.

Admittedly, it's hard to know where to start. So start at the beginning, like when Huang was 5 and Iris, a United Airlines customer service representative, signed him up for violin lessons, thereby setting the foundation for his lifelong love of music. Or start at age 6, when Andy, an environmental engineer for Naval Facilities Engineering Command Hawaii, brought him to his junior team tennis lessons, introducing him to a sport that has brought a sense of balance to his many academic and musical pursuits. The music was always big, from violin lessons to the after-school ukulele program at Manoa Elementary to the Kaimuki Middle School band, where Huang took up the oboe and found himself surrounded by people who enjoyed playing just as much as he did. Huang continues to play the oboe for the high school band and for the Youth Symphony II while keeping his violin skills sharp playing at Waiialae Baptist Church.

"Music teaches you to enjoy what you are doing first and foremost," Huang says. "It starts with an innocent love for the instrument and for music in general, and then with discipline and hard work you can be as good as you want to be."

Huang said he's found a similar sense of shared purpose and community through tennis, particularly at the varsity level where individual effort and performance are directed toward team goals.

Despite a competitive streak wrought though years of playing with and against his older brother Darrell, a sophomore at Harvard University, Huang said he enjoys the camaraderie of the sport and the opportunity to help new players find their place.

"It's always about the team," he says.

The sentiment echoes across Huang's many academic and extracurricular pursuits. Huang participated in the Japan Super Science Fair in Kyoto with four other Kalani classmates and thrice was on the team representing Kalani at the Science Bowl, once advancing to regional competition in Oregon. He and his teammates were so inspired by what they learned about science clubs in other schools that they took the initiative to start their own club at Kalani, writing their own charter, selecting leaders and recruiting classmates of all grade levels to join in the fun.

Two years ago Huang (who also serves as president of the school's National Honor Society chapter) and a small group of classmates applied for and were accepted to the Pacific Asian Affairs Council's Global Leadership Program, an experience that culminated with a trip to Shanghai. Upon his return Huang again felt compelled to share the experience by helping to found a PAAC chapter at Kalani. Huang said his activities are a natural outgrowth of his interests and the nurturing environment Kalani provides and is not intended, he emphasizes, to pad his resume. Yet, Huang admittedly has sought to join his brother at Harvard, a goal brought to painful clarity after a campus visit last year. Just recently, Huang received word that he indeed had been accepted — with a scholarship package too good to refuse. He intends to study neurobiology with an eye toward completing a Medical Scientist Training Program (combining an M.D. and Ph.D.) and eventually working as a surgeon.

"My parents have been super supportive, and I'm very appreciative of that," he said. "And Kalani is great at exposing students to different opportunities and encouraging them to get involved." There he goes again.

Teen model giving back to others less fortunate

Like the runway model she'd worked diligently (and painfully) to become over the last year, Victoria Tan executed her last pivot this weekend with both poise and conviction. On Saturday, Tan, 17, strolled into Varsity Barber, took a seat and proceeded to let owner June Chan snip away nearly a foot of her straight, black tresses. For a young woman just weeks removed from walking the runways at the Paris Fashion Week, the divestiture of such a signature asset was more than just a little symbolic.

"Modeling was a good experience, and I learned a lot from it, but it's more of a side interest," said Tan, a junior at Kalani High School. "I really want to focus more on my studies so I can get into a good college." Saturday's trip to the barber offered both a ceremonial end to Tan's modeling pursuits and a symbolic start to a challenging season of SATs, college applications and campus visits. And in keeping with Tan's lifelong devotion to helping others, her shorn hair was bound and donated to a charitable organization that makes wigs for children with long-term medical hair loss.

The limitless opportunities available to Tan and her two younger brothers, and the freedom that they enjoy in pursuing their interests, were secured at great risk when their parents Victor and Elena, both accomplished Chinese acrobats, defected to the United States (separately) in the 1980s.

Victoria was born in Hawaii, where her parents settled after a brief stint in New York. After securing U.S. citizenship, the Tans returned to China for several years before returning to Hawaii for good five years ago. Last year, younger brother Virgil went to an open audition for child models, and Victoria tagged along for moral support. The agent in charge took one look at the thin, 5-foot-9 Victoria and asked her whether she'd be interested in modeling. Tan had never entertained the idea of modeling before, but thought it sounded interesting and signed up for a workshop. Soon after, she was invited to walk at the Los Angeles Fashion Week. To prepare for the event, Tan, accompanied by her father, practiced walking around Kahala Mall, Magic Island and other spots wearing high heels. "I had never worn high heels before," Tan said, laughing. "It was so painful." Painful or not, Tan acquitted herself well and wound up walking for three different designers in L.A.

An opportunity to walk at the New York Fashion Week followed. Tan knew that the event was bigger and more formal, and that she would be up against a much larger field of prospective models, most with many more years of experience. Yet, as her parents had always encouraged, Tan set aside her fears, worked hard to prepare and set off to New York determined to get the most out of the experience, no matter what might happen. "There were about a hundred models in the lobby trying to earn one of 15 spots," said Tan of an audition for Jessie Liu. "They were all tall and pretty and skinny, and when you were asked to walk, you did it in front of all of them, which was really intimidating." Yet, once again, Tan did well for herself, securing a spot in the lineup and executing everything she had learned in her brief training.

Tan already knew that she wanted to devote her full attentions to her academic and volunteer work when the chance to participate in the Paris Fashion Week came up. She jumped at the opportunity to visit Paris and to participate in one of the world's premier fashion events even as she knew her appearance would be something of a valedictory walk. The trip would have even deeper meaning for her family. Both Victor and Elena had performed in the City of Lights more than 27 years earlier as members of the Guanzhou Acrobat Troupe. Tan, in high heels and with a book carefully balanced at the top of her head, once again practiced hard for the event. She studied the runway approach. She summoned her parents' performative discipline to keep her balance ("I was worried that I'd trip and fall") and maintain the placid composure her coaches exhorted her to keep. And yet, upon arriving in Paris, Tan caught a cold. Then she slipped on ice and badly twisted her ankle. Then the jet lag kicked in. Undeterred, Tan successfully walked for both Ellae Lisque and Indonesian fashion house LeViCo, participated in a fashion shoot and still had enough time to see the sights with her father.

Her Year of Living Fashionably now complete, Tan has wasted little time getting back into the flow of school and volunteer work. She's a straight-A student and a member of the school golf team. Outside of school, Tan performs with her brothers Vincent and Virgil and cousin Harry for the Boys & Girls Club of Hawaii, senior centers, hospitals and other organizations, playing the guzheng (a Chinese zither) and yueqin (moon guitar), and has volunteered at a children's art program.

In preparation for a recent trip to China, Tan raised money and collected candy and books for a Chinese orphanage for children with disabilities. "Everybody needs attention and love, and I felt happy to help them," she said. "My life is pretty good, and I want to do whatever I can to help others enjoy a better life."

Kalani High hoops team reveals character

The Kalani High School boys basketball team has a favorite saying: "Character revealed!" The players say it when someone is late for practice. They also say it when someone comes through in a clutch. "It gets past any excuses," assistant coach Nathan Davis says. "It's a reminder that what is important is how they act as people."

On Sunday, Kalani's JV and varsity teams held an end-of-season luncheon at Dave & Buster's to celebrate their winning year and, more important, their character revealed. The players showed up wearing collared shirts. There wasn't a dress code. The older boys just told the younger players to dress nice. Each player went to the front of the room, took the microphone, thanked his parents, coaches and teammates and shared a favorite memory from the year. Some were funny, some were brief but all were sincere. "Basketball is good but there's other stuff. Just making them speak in public, that's a good skill to pick up," assistant coach Noa Hussey told the parents and younger siblings in attendance.

It's a different program. The players are required to keep journals during the season. They share their writing with one another, finding strength by revealing fears and vulnerabilities. They each are paired with an "accountability partner" to make sure both reach goals and keep commitments, from grades to good behavior.

One of the season's big moments of "character revealed" was in the Feb. 7 game against Roosevelt for the Oahu Interscholastic Association Division II championship. It was a chance for Kalani's redemption after losing the title to the Rough Riders in triple overtime in 2016. Kalani's 61-52 triumph this year was largely due to 15-year-old Brandon Chung. "He was in foul trouble early," Hussey said. "He didn't play most of the first half, but in the second half he was the reason we won." Hussey described Chung's 11-point second-half performance like he is still dazzled by what he saw. Except for one free-throw attempt, Chung made every shot he took. "He was a sophomore playing in a championship game. The gym was packed. He had maybe a hundred people back home on Maui watching the game live on TV. This was pressure and he wasn't rattled at all. To respond that way, to have that maturity at his age." Hussey smiles, remembering the moment. "And he was so patient, not demanding the ball, just letting the game come to him."

Chung was named most valuable player for the game. "I was the first deaf person to get that, so it was really an honor," Chung said. He's a boarding student at the Hawaii School for the Deaf and the Blind. This year there are six students from HSDB competing on Kalani athletic teams, the most ever. The accommodations aren't a big deal. Chung's sign language interpreter, Danny Gong, who was with him at every practice and every game, made a YouTube tutorial video of basketball-related signs for the team with terms like "post up," "rebound" and "watch your back." Chung was also patient with his teammates' ad lib signs. He can read lips. "And I can talk," Chung said, "so they understand me."

The last time there was a news story about Chung, he was 6-foot-2. Since the state championship last month, when Kalani came in third, Chung has grown and is closer to 6-foot-3 now. The entire team has grown. After the lunch was over, the boys pushed in their chairs, thanked their mothers and went together to play the restaurant's arcade games. No rowdiness. Just fun to be had and character to be revealed.
