The United States **Presidential Scholars** Program is a program of the Department of Education that recognizes the academic achievements of distinguished US citizens graduating high school. It is described as "one of the Nation's highest honors for high school students" in the United States of America. The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964, by executive order of the President, to recognize and honor some of our nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. Each year, up to 161 students (2 from each state) are named as Presidential Scholars, one of the nation's highest honors for high school students.

GOVERNOR IGE APPOINTS DERRICK H.M. CHAN (KALANI 1973) TO INTERMEDIATE COURT OF APPEALS



HONOLULU – Gov. David Ige today announced the appointment of First Circuit chief judge Derrick H.M. Chan to the Intermediate Court of Appeals to fill the vacancy created by the retirement in December 2016 of former Associate Judge Daniel R. Foley. Chan, 61, was appointed as a Circuit Court Judge on Aug. 25, 2000. Prior to this he was the First Deputy Prosecutor for the County of Kaua'i. He also served as an attorney for the Hawaii Carpenters Union, as Deputy Public Defender for the state, law clerk to Judge Wilfred Watanabe, and Deputy Attorney General for the state. Chan graduated from Kalani High School in 1973 and is a 1985 graduate of California Western School of Law. "I'm honored that the governor has the confidence in me to fill this position. His nomination will allow me to continue serving the people of Hawai'i. I look forward to meeting with senators and the Hawaii State Bar Association during the confirmation process," said Chan.

Gov. Ige selected Chan from a list of six nominees provided by the Judicial Selection Commission on January 4. The Intermediate Court of Appeals (ICA) is the court that hears nearly all appeals from trial courts and some state agencies in the State of Hawai'i. The ICA is composed of six judges who sit on panels of three. "In his years on the bench, Judge Chan has adjudicated cases in both family and drug courts, in criminal and civil trials, and in probate court. As an attorney, he represented individuals, organizations and the state. I have full faith in his ability to continue his service in the judicial system at the Intermediate Court of Appeals," said Gov. Ige.

Chan's appointment is subject to senate confirmation.

Congratulations : Dong Jin Hwang

DJ signs a Letter of Intent with Northwestern University

Kalani's **DongJin Hwang** finished his remarkable swimming career with two more gold medals at the Oahu Interscholastic Association championships Saturday at Veterans Memorial Aquatic Complex. All told, Hwang has 10 total gold medals in his collection. Hwang also topped his 500-yard freestyle record twice over the weekend. In Friday's trials, he covered the distance in 4 minutes, 36.58 seconds to break the mark of 4:37.17 he set last year. Then, on Saturday, Hwang, who says he goes by DJ, blazed to a 4:33.76 to win the OIA 500 free title for the third time. He also swam to a win in the 200 freestyle (1:45.03) Saturday. Hwang is the first 10-time OIA gold-medal winner since **Kevin Frifeldt** of Mililani, who chalked up 11 golds from 2011 to 2014. "It's a good indication that (I'm) doing the right things," said Hwang, who will swim for Northwestern next season. Early next month, he'll go for his second straight state gold medal in the 500 free.:

George Kuo

George Kuo was born on November 17, 1955, but his beautiful slack key guitar style dates back a generation or two earlier. "I feel a lot of appreciation for the old style of slack key and the lifestyle of my grandparents, granduncles, grandaunts and all the older players. There's a special aloha for them that I try to convey in my style of slack key." "My feeling is in the playing from the 1940s," he continues. "I like to play a nice relaxed, easy style. Not too much fancy stuff, keep it within the melody. It's more delivering a message than playing runs."

George first took up *ki ho'alu* in high school. He learned from friends such as Antone Gabriel, who played in the style of his granduncle, Albert Kawelo, slack key legend Ray Kane's teacher in the early 1930s. "When I heard Antone," George says, "I said to myself 'that's how I want to play the old style.'" George's family was very supportive of his music. "My granduncle and aunt really encouraged me."

For a young person attracted to oldstyle *ki ho'alu*, the 1970s were heaven in Hawai'i. A revival of traditional culture was in full bloom.

Many *kupuna* (elders) performed and shared their *mana'o* (knowledge) publicly - often for the first time. George learned from legendary slack key figures such as Ray Kane, Auntie Alice Namakelua, Tommy Solomon, Sonny Chillingworth, Atta Isaacs, Gabby Pahinui, Uncle Fred Punahoa, and Papa Kahi. "That was a real rare opportunity to be with those old masters," he says. "The expressions and the feelings that they get when they play, you can see it on their faces. They smile 'cause they feel the vibration, the *ona* (feeling of well-being). It goes throughout their body and moves their spirit. To me that's what the enjoyment is about right there. If I ever run into an old timer who tells me he plays slack key, I always encourage him because once they go, *pau* (the end), you can't hear that anymore."

Through high school and college, George continued playing the clubs (with Tino Jacob, Ray Kane, Sonny Chillingworth and others), and studying with the masters. He acquired a large repertoire of standards and originals, to which he continues to add today. In 1979 he won a slack key guitar contest at the Waikiki Shell, which brought him to the attention of a wider audience and launched his performing career. In 1980 he released his first album, NAHENAHE, on the Hula label. He also formed the group Kipapa Rush Band with a number of friends, including Wayne Reis, a nephew of Atta Isaacs. In 1985 they recorded HARDLY WORKING for the Kahanu label. "We had a real nice traditional feeling with a little of today's music." In addition to slack key, the group featured steel guitar, reflecting the revival of interest in this Hawaiian innovation.

In 1986 Eddie Kamae asked George to join his group The Sons of Hawaii. George considers this a great honor and feels a special kinship with the other members. He also enjoys Eddie's style as a band leader. "He's not one to tell anybody what to do in the group," George says, "he just says, 'let's go and play and have fun', and we go. It's not a rehearsed thing. We communicate it through playing." This closely matches George's approach on ALOHA NO NA KUPUNA. "There's no overdubbing on the album," he says. "Most of the arrangements were done in the studio, or a day or two before. I like spontaneity." A lot of George's ideas come from playing with others or by himself after work. "I play a lot outside on my porch late at night," he says. "I enjoy the sound of the guitar in the night." Still, recording solo was something he never expected to do. "It's a different experience," he says, "but once you get into it, it comes out real nice."

Skateboard Rack

Students, some of you have already noticed, we have a skateboard dock on campus near the main office. We understand that skateboards are a mode of transportation and we want to accommodate as many of you as we can but we currently ONLY have 20 slots. UH Center for Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CCBT) and Kalani HS Collaboration, Highlighted Mental Health Topic of the Week: Tips and Techniques for Test Anxiety and Optimizing Performance

In December 2016, a few ninth grade teachers requested that CCBT staff complete several presentations to Kalani students on optimizing performance and test anxiety management strategies. Initial feedback from indicated that these presentations were useful and students looked forward to trying out these strategies as they headed into end of the quarter tests and exams. Several main strategies from the presentation are outlined below.

What should my child do to optimize their performance? Within the context of maintaining their anxiety at optimal levels, you can help them to get enough sleep, eat a well-balanced diet (e.g., protein and whole grains), move during breaks or listen to calming music rather than go online, and plan to study over time rather than cram. In addition, to help them stay calm when feeling stressed, remind them to practice deep belly breathing (<http://dailyburn.com/life/lifestyle/stressed-gifs-breathing-exercises/>), progressive muscle relaxation, (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=aaTDNYjk-Gw>), and mindfulness/meditation by using phone apps, such as Headspace. National Merit Semi-Finalist

Congratulations to **Kacie Kajihara** and **Emily Yang**

Kacie and Emily are amongst the 16,000 Semifinalists (two of the 66 in the State of Hawaii) in the 62nd annual National Merit Scholarship Program. These two academically talented high school seniors have the opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,400 National Merit Scholarships worth more than 32 million that will be offered in the spring.

The minimum qualifying score on last year's PSAT test to be a semi-finalist is 217.

Congratulations also to Christopher Lindsay (transfer from Iolani) who is also a National Merit Semi-Finalist.

National Merit Commended Students

The following students have been named Commended Students in the 2017 National Merit Scholarship Program. About 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation are recognized for their exceptional academic promise. These Commended Students placed among the top 5% of more than 1.5 million students who entered the 2017 competition by taking the

Maunakea Scholars Program

Kalani High School students win research time with Maunakea telescopes

Three ambitious Kalani High School students will conduct sophisticated astronomical research using some of the world's most powerful telescopes. The aspiring astronomers were awarded time to use two Maunakea observatories as a part of the Maunakea Scholars program-an innovative partnership between the Maunakea Observatories and the Hawaii State Department of Education (HIDOE).

Working alongside Institute for Astronomy graduate student mentors at the University of Hawaii, the students developed professional-style research proposals for the review and selection of the Maunakea Scholars time allocation committee. The committee selected the three winning proposals:

Spencer Young was awarded two hours of observing time with the East Asian Observatory (EAO) using the James Clerk Maxwell Telescope (JCMT) POL-2 instruments for his research proposal, "Star forming regions and how they retain their shapes."

David Higashi was awarded one hour of observing time with Canada-France-Hawaii Telescope (CFHT) using the instrument ESPaDOnS for his research proposal, "The Creation of the Moon."

Jordaynelexi Drasal was awarded 30 minutes of observing time with CFHT using the instrument Megacam for her research proposal, "Globular Star Clusters."

Kalani High School to Participate in the College Board's AP Capstone™ Program

Diploma Program Focuses on Inquiry, Research, and Writing Skills Crucial for College and Career Success

Honolulu, Hawaii — Kalani High School is one of approximately 1,000 schools worldwide to implement AP Capstone™—an innovative diploma program that allows students to develop the skills that matter most for college success: research, collaboration, and communication. The program consists of two courses taken in sequence: AP® Seminar and AP Research. Developed in direct response to feedback from higher education faculty and college admission officers, AP Capstone complements the in-depth, subject-specific study of other Advanced Placement® courses and exams.

Students who earn scores of 3 or higher on AP Seminar and AP Research assessments and on four additional AP Exams of their choosing will earn the AP Capstone Diploma™. This signifies their outstanding academic achievement and attainment of college-level academic and research skills. Students who earn scores of 3 or higher on both AP Seminar and AP Research assessments only (but not on four additional AP Exams) will earn the AP Seminar and Research Certificate™. The AP Seminar course, typically taken in 10th or 11th grade, equips students with the ability to look at real-world issues from multiple perspectives. Through a variety of materials—articles to research studies to foundational and philosophical texts—students tackle complex questions; understand and evaluate opposing viewpoints; interpret and synthesize information; and construct, communicate, and defend evidence-based arguments. Education, innovation, sustainability, and technology are examples of themes or topics covered in AP Seminar. However, teachers have the flexibility to choose subject content based on student interests, whether local, regional, national, or global. By tapping into students’ personal interests, AP Capstone gives students from a wide range of backgrounds an entry point into stimulating coursework more than ever before. Students are assessed through: a team project and presentation, an individual project and presentation, and an end-of-course written exam.

In the subsequent AP Research course, students design, plan, and conduct a yearlong research-based investigation on a topic of individual interest, documenting their process with a portfolio.
