FIRST Tech Challenge FTC Robotics Congratulations Team Magma

Kalani had three teams competing in tournaments across the islands, including Kaua'i. It was a competitive season and we were required to improve our robots throughout the entire season. The Culminating District Tournament was held at Le Jardin Academy, with 31 teams participating. The top 20 competed to advance to the State Championship. All three of our teams successfully placed within the top 20. In addition to match play, teams participated in judged interviews. All three advanced to callback interviews, with only nine total slots available. At the State Championship, all three of our teams advanced to the finals - the only public school represented in the final lineup.

Our teams did not advance to the championship match but all three teams won major awards:
Connect, Sustainability, and Think Awards, 3rd, 4th, and 5th place respectively.

While our teams did not qualify for the World Championship this year, two of the teams qualified for Premier events to be held this summer. Last year, one of our teams competed in Chicago and earned the Inspire Award, demonstrating continued growth and excellence at the national level. Our teams performed at an exceptionally high level, demonstrating resilience, teamwork, and technical skill. It was an outstanding season and a strong showing by Kalani students.

Kalani High School requirements for athletic participation:

- Completion and submission of Athletic Registration (New to Kalani? Create a new account and remember your password. Returnees log in with their password.
- Sign up and try out for a team.
- Once selected to a team, student-athlete will pay the \$80.00 ASET Fee

Athletic Supply, Equipment & Transportation (ASET) \$80.00

Once your child has been selected to a team, parents will receive an email asking you to log into your child's account to pay the \$80.00 ASET fee. The amount of money allocated by the DOE for Athletic Transportation is much less than is needed considering the current cost of buses. This fee (pays for buses and other transportation costs) is charged once per school year regardless of the number of teams your child gets selected for.

The **ASET Fee** is charged once per school year for the first sport a student plays.

- If your child played a fall sport this year, you won't need to make any additional payment.
- Payment is made **online through GoFans** once your child is selected for a team.
- We no longer accept in-person payments.
- A small transaction fee applies.
- A payment link will be sent when it is time to pay.

AHERA

In 1986, Congress passed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) which mandated the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule, 40 CFR Part 763. It requires all primary and secondary school buildings to be inspected by AHERA accredited inspectors and to identify all asbestos-containing building materials. The rule further requires the development of a management plan by an AHERA accredited management planner that is based on the findings of the inspection. The management plan outlines our intent in controlling the potential for exposure to asbestos fibers in our school. In February 2001, Hawaii Administrative Rules Chapter 11-502 was adopted by the Hawaii State Legislature. These rules essentially mirror the requirements of the AHERA regulations. In both cases, the rule requires our school to notify parents, teachers, and employees of the presence and status of asbestos containing material in our school buildings.

The initial inspection of our school was conducted in 1958 and identifies some asbestos-containing materials. Since that time, we continue to conduct periodic surveillance and triennial re-inspections to ensure that the asbestos-containing materials remain in good condition and do not pose a hazard to our students and staff. An asbestos management plan was drafted based on our initial inspection and submitted to the Hawaii State Department of Health. It outlines in detail the methods we will use to maintain the material in a safe manner. The management plan is updated regularly as asbestos is removed or conditions change. A copy of the management plan is on file in the administrative office and is available for your review during our regular school hours.
