



Carlos Cave, CMAA

Carlos Cave, CMAA, has been an athletic administrator since 2005 and is currently the district athletic director of the Beaufort County School District (BCSD) in Bluffton, South Carolina. Prior to his appointment as district athletic director, Cave was athletic director of Whale Branch Early College High School for 11 years after beginning his career as a teacher and coach in the Allendale County School District.

At the state level, Cave serves on the executive board of the South Carolina Athletic Administrators Association (SCAAA) and was the association's president in 2014-15. He is an LTI coordinator and state faculty instructor, and he has been a workshop presenter at SCAAA state conferences. He also is a member of the South Carolina Football Coaches Association and the South Carolina Football Coaches Association and Field Coaches Association and Field Coaches Association.

Cave also has been a major contributor to the South Carolina High School League (SCHSL) and currently serves as vice president of the SCHSL Executive Committee.

Within the NIAAA, Cave is a Leadership Training Institute (LTI) national faculty member for Leader ship Training Course (LTC) 608 and contributed to the course revision in 2022. He is also a certified test administrator and has completed more than 30 LTCs. Cave has been a contributor to

Russell Wambles, CMAA, has been an athletic administrator in Florida for more than 25 years, including his current position as athletic director at Olympia High School in Orlando, Florida.

Wambles served two stints as athletic director at Apopka High School (from 2017-18 and 2005-11). Between his stints at Apopka, he served as athletic director at Dr. Phillips High School in Orlando, from 2011 to

2017. Previously, Wambles was athletic director and teacher at Tavares High School from 1998 to 2005, where he also coached varsity baseball.

2005, where he also coached varsity baseball. Throughout his career, Wambles has been active at the state level serving athletic administrators and coaches. Wambles currently serves on the board of directors of the Florida Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (FIAAA), where he was president in 2013.

Wambles also served on the board of the directors for the Florida High School Athletic Association (FHSAA) from 2008 to 2014. He also served one term on the FHSAA Athletic Director Advisory Committee and the FHSAA Repre-



Wambles joined the NIAAA membership 18 years ago and has made his presence known in multiple ways. His volunteer positions include Leadership Training Institute (LTI) national faculty member, test administrator, and National Initiative and Assistance Network (NIAN)

Committee member.

At the National Athletic Directors Conference, Wambles has been a state delegate for Florida six times and been a member of the National Host Committee three times from 2005 to 2015. In NIAAA Section 3 meetings, he has been a representative for Florida several times.

In 2018, Wambles earned the NIAAA State Award of Merit. He also led Apopka High School to earn the Fred Rozelle State Sportsmanship Award in 2010 and 2019. He also has received the NFHS Citation, the FIAAA Clarence Noe State Athletic Director of the Year, and the FIAAA Meritorious Service Award.

From serving locally to being president of the NIAAA, Lanness Robinson, CMAA, has been a major contributor to the profession of high school athletic administration. He currently is the district athletic director at Hillsborough County Public Schools in Tampa, Florida, and has more than 20 years of experience as an athletic administrator.

Robinson's other involvements in the NIAAA include being a Lead-ership Training Institute (LTI) state coordinator since 2007, serving as an LTI national faculty member for 10 years, and helping revise several LTI courses. Starting in 2022, Robinson joined the NIAAA Professional Development Academy (PDA) Leadership Team. Robinson has completed 49 NIAAA Leadership Training Courses.

Before his time as a member of the PDA staff, Robinson volunteered on the NIAAA Board of Directors for five years. His term as NIAAA president was in 2020 during the COVID-19 pandemic. He helped the NIAAA and NFH5 facilitate the annual National Athletic Directors Conference (NADC) to be a virtual conference that year.

Other involvements in the NIAAA include serving as an LTI legal course national faculty member, Fourth Strategic Planning Committee



member, Awards Committee member, course revisions/development committee member for five courses, and LTI state coordinator since 2007.

Robinson is heavily involved in the National Athletic Directors Conference (NADC), presenting at it twice and being on the Host Committee for five different conferences. In the Florida Interscholastic

In the Florida Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (FIAAA), Robinson is the past

president on the FIAAA Board of Directors and chair of the FIAAA Strategic Planning Committee. He was president in 2009-10, and he is a state LTI instructor.

At the local level, Robinson is the executive director of the National Football Foundation (NFF) Tampa Chapter. He also serves as the chair of a Sports Medicine Advisory Committee and the executive director of the Freddie Solomon Legacy Foundation. Within his school district, he has helped raise and present more than \$1 million in scholarships to student-athletes. Robinson has been honored previously with an

BRUCE D. WHITEHEAD DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Kelly Fish, CMAA

Brentwood, Tennessee

Kelly Fish has served on the staff at currey Ingram Academy in Brentwood, Tennessee, since 2011, She was director of athletics for grades 5-12 for 11 years, and last year, was promoted to assistant head of school for advancement and strategic initiatives. She previously worked at Belmont University in leadership positions in both advancement and athletics.

Fish served as the membership coordinator for the Tennessee Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (TIAAA) from 2016 to 2023. During that time, the organization experienced 300-percent growth and received membership commendations from the NIAAA multiple times.

Fish teaches Leadership Training Courses for the NIAAA at the state and national levels and serves as the course chair for LTC 701. She is currently serving a two-year term as the president the TIAAA Board of Directors (2023-25). In 2018, Fish was named one of 20 administrators and educators nationwide as a national team member of the Safe Sport Zone.



At the TIAAA State Conference in 2021, Fish presented a workshop, and she completed a Leadership Cohort within the Tennessee Association of Independent Schools (TAIS) from 2019 to 2020.

Fish joined the NIAAA membership in 2012 and has attended every National Athletic Directors Conference since. She was a member of the NADC Host Committee for both of the nast two national conferences

of the past two national conference in Nashville (2016, 2022), and she was chair of last year's Host Committee.

Fish has taken 26 Leadership Training Courses (LTCs) and was a Leadership Training Institute (LTI) national faculty instructor for LTC 700. She is currently on the national faculty for LTC 701. She has been a workshop presenter several times, contributed as a Tennessee state delegate, and been a moderator for LTC sessions.

Among her awards, Fish has received the TIAAA J. Richard Carroll Leadership Award, the NIAAA State Award of Merit, and the Tennessee Bruce D. Whitehead Distinguished Service Award.

Mike Ellson, CMAA, gave 30 years as a director of athletics before retiring a few years ago. He exemplified great dedication and spent his entire athletic administration career working at Christ Presbyterian Academy in Nashville, Tennessee. In Christ Presbyterian Academy's

In Christ Presbyterian Academy's third year of existence, Ellson built the athletic program from scratch. He personally led and coached all athletic teams in 1987 and served as

the only athletic director. He recruited volunteers to serve in the athletic booster club and athletic alliance. Elison mentored and evaluated coaches in sports including golf, cheerleading, football, basketball, soccer and more.

basketball, soccer and more. Ellson also helped develop the sports medicine program at Christ Presbyterian. He did so with assistance from local physicians and physical therapy institutions, as well as consulting with a

neurosurgeon regarding concussions. Ellson earned his Certified Athletic Administrator (CAA) designation in 2005 and his Certified Master Athletic Administrator (CMAA) designation in 2008. He has completed more than 50 Leadership Training Courses and is the chair of LTC 705 and co-chair of LTC 716. For more than 10 years, Ellson served as a state coordinator for



Currently, Ellson works with the NIAAA Professional Development Academy staff. He oversees university partnerships, the Quality Program Assessment, NIAAA-U Cohorts and new course development. Ellson himself successfully completed the QPA process when he was an athletic administrator. In addition, Ellson completed an NIAAA-U Cohort and has served as a mentor for others. As a member of the Tennessee

Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (TIAAA), Elison has attended more than 30 state conferences and been a TIAAA board member since 2007. He was the TIAAA newsletter editor for several years. On the TIAAA hoard, Elison served a term as president and currently serves as the organization's executive director.

At the National Athletic Directors Conference (NADC), Elison has been a workshop presenter and taught Leadership Training classes. At the annual NIAAA State Coordinators Summit, Elison has contributed by presenting, moderating and mentoring new coordinators. Elison served on the Host Committee for the 2022 national conference in Nathwille

Ellson's honors include the NIAAA Frank Kovaleski Professional Development Award and NIAAA State Award of Merit.

Lauren Otero, CMAA

Tampa, Florida

Since her first year as an athletic director in 2009, Lauren Otero, CMAA, has quickly risen to be one of the most respected athletic administrators in Florida and the nation. After five years as athletic director of Leto High School, Otero worked as the athletic director of Plant High School for seven years before joining Hillsborough County Public Schools (HCPS) as project manager of athletic facilities in 2021.

In her current role, Otero has been a presenter at the Future Leaders Academy Assistant Principals Summer Conference, was a charter bus/ travel agency bid selection committee member, a committee member of the athletics department's Guidebook of Procedures review team, co-chair of the Sports Medicine Advisory Committee and developer of the HCPS mentoring program for new athletic administrators.

At the state level, Otero served as the first female president of the Florida High School Athletic Association (FHSAA) Board of Directors. She also served on the FHSAA Representative Assembly, was a presenter at the Compliance Seminar and served as chair of the FHSAA Operations Committee.



In addition, Otero has served on the Florida Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (FIAAA) Board of Directors since 2012. During her time on the Board, she has served on the Leadership Council Committee, chaired the Audit and Review Committee, is a LTI instructor, has been a conference presenter, and currently serves as State Awards chair.

Nationally, Otero obtained her

Nationally, Otero obtained her CAA distinction in her first year of NIAAA membership and then earned her CMAA certification two years later. She is currently one of two female athletic administrators in Florida who have earned a CMAA. She has been on the National Athletic Directors Conference (NADC) Host Committee and was serving as chair of the Host Committee for the 2020 NADC in Tampa until it had to be carcelled due to the pandems.

Otero is a National Faculty member, served on the NIAAA Awards Committee, has been a Florida delegate and was a member of the Finance Subcommittee for the NIAAA's 5th Strategic Plan. She currently serves as the secretary of the NIAAA Board of Directors.


